MOSES UP IN ARMS AGAIN.

He Charges that he has Been
Bilked by "Them Interior
Fellers."

Wants Colville or nothing---
Prospects For Another
Rumpus.

Somebody Must feel Astonished.

WALLA WALLA, May 16.—A council was held last night at Walla Walla on the steamer Northwest with Moses and other Indians by General Howard and Gov. Ferry. Moses says that the reservation that they are going to put him on is not the one he asked for and was given him, yet his own map showed where he marked out the place himself, that he desired and was given him. McBean, the interpreter, says he agreed in every particular to accept the reservation laid off for him between the Okanogan river on the east and the Cascade mountains on the west. Moses says he wants the Colville reservation; for that is what he went to Washington for. Secretary Schurz has been telegraphed to for instructions. Meantime the Indians and the civil and military party will proceed to Kittitas valley and wait a reply. Moses looks downhearted and thinks he has been fooled by the interior department, to whom all blame can be attached if a war occurs.

Eastern States.

James Keene declined to serve as an Erie director, pleading his wheat business. He was offered a place on the executive committee of the board.

Garibaldi has resolved to live (and die) in Rome.

The greater part of Lublin, a city of 20,000 inhabitants in Russian Poland, has been destroyed by fire.

A treaty between Germany and Samoa has been published unofficially. It is quite favorable to Germany.

The French are taking in the English fishermen. A coast guard cutter captured six vessels and took them to Granville last week.

A letter has been received from Prof. Nordenskjold, of the polar expedition, from Siberia, dated September 27, 1878, announcing that all connected with the expedition were well.

A monster mass meeting of colliers in London on the 16th resolved that they would starve rather than submit to the award of the judge of the Durham county court. Upwards of thirty delegates from various colliers went to Durham to demand fresh inquiry.

Two heavy firms with all the letters of the alphabet in their names (Afrikanische Handelsvereining and Commanditove Bankvereining) failed at Rotterdam last week for £750,000. The London agents have suspended in consequence. What's in a name, after all, to be sure?
