Press Comments.

Vancouver Independent, June 12th.

The rumors flying thick and fast of the sale of the Oregon Steam Navigation company's boats and property connect Jay Gould's name with the purchasing parties. If this report is true the people will witness a grand race between the Northern Pacific Railroad company and the Union Pacific, to first get through railroad connection with this country, and we can joyfully set by to watch the dirt and dollars fly.

Olympia Experiment, June 12th.

A strong current of opinion among Oregon railroad men is daily growing in favor of Astoria as a terminal point between ocean and inland routes. To bring about such a result, all the sooner, the people of Astoria are wisely taking sides with Portland in the upper country railroad scheme, well knowing that, so soon as the latter city has unbroken railroad communication with the wheat-growing region of Eastern Oregon and Washington, it is but a question of time that Astoria will be made the final entrepot for the whole of Oregon's incoming and out-going commerce.

Oregon City Enterprise, June 12th.

We think the Astorian is premature in announcing the sale of the Oregon Steam Navigation company transfer, to be made on July 1st. It is quite likely negotiations are pending. We judge so because the Oregonian is getting kind to Senator Mitchell, but we do not think a conclusion is yet arrived at. Ireland is a good deal like the Millerites, who are predicting the coming to the end of the world from date to date with an absolute certainty that they will hit it between dates sometime; and the probabilities of the transfer of the Oregon Steam Navigation company being good, Brother Ireland does not hazard much to prophesy.

The Dalles Mountaineer, June 12th.

The story that the Oregon Steam Navigation company was about to sell out to the company represented by Jay Gould, appears to be true. We can't see that this change is going to be of any benefit to the citizens of The Dalles. In fact, we shall be sorry to see the change take place. If we are destined not to have competition on the Columbia river by steamboat or railroad, then we would much prefer the old company to remain in possession. The Oregon Steam Navigation company is a monopoly; but, as such, it is the best one on the Pacific coast, and we would rather bear the ills we now have, than fly to others we know not of.

The Indian Question.

Rev. G. H. Atkinson has lately visited the Spokane falls, and while there gave a lecture on the Indian situation in which he took the ground favoring the Indian segregated farm policy of the better class of Indians and the breaking up of several of the reservations. The reverend gentleman is gradually changing his original ground upon this question, and is a clear reasoner from the facts and events that have developed themselves within the two years last past. He is not so wedded to the old Indian ring theory that he will not, like some others, relinquish it when convinced of its failure to benefit either the Indian or the white man.

The peach trees in the vicinity of Walla Walla are fairly bowed down with their loads of fruit, the Union says: "It is difficult to tell what the damage will be to the trees when the fruit attains its full growth.
