TELEGRAPHIC.

EASTERN STATES.

Was Not Vetted.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—The president has approved the bill making appropriations for the legislative expenses of the government. The judicial and army appropriation bills reached the executive mansion at 3:30 o'clock. The president had just left in his carriage on a visit to the navy yard. The judicial bill will not receive his approval.

Another Extra Session Threatened.

NEW YORK, June 20.—There are indications that the present session of congress will be adjourned on Saturday or Monday next, but that the recess will last only a day or two. The bill providing for judicial expenses will not be vetoed, and if congress adjourns without passing the judicial appropriation bill the president will call it together again within twenty-four hours of adjournment.

New York Harbor.

NEW YORK, June 21.—The steamship Italy, hence for Liverpool to-day, ran into the German ship Barbarossa, which arrived from Havre on the 19th inst. and at anchor in the bay, sinking her. While the Italy was backing from the wreck she collided with the steamship Canada, for London. The Canada was obliged to return to her dock. The Italy proceeded to sea. It is reported that the Canada has four feet of water in her hold.

Kentucky Hoists.

CINCINNATI, June 20.—Advices from Frankfort, Kentucky, indicate a probability that troops will be sent to Breathitt county immediately. A trial of desperadoes will be held soon in that county. A number of their adherents have been sending letters to Governor McCreary regarding the same, threatening to annihilate the troops if sent to protect the court. It is stated that the governor has concluded that there is a necessity for the immediate presence of troops.

The Grant Excursion.

PHILADELPHIA, June 20.—The North American of Wednesday says: The Souder legislative Grant reception committee has come to grief. The Pennsylvania railroad company are unable to furnish free transportation to San Francisco on account of the war between the Pennsylvania company and the Union Pacific, and the plans of the committee have therefore been changed. As now understood, the committee will meet the ex-president on the borders of the state.

Sand-Lot Programme in New York.

NEW YORK, June 20.—There is a prospect, if the police do not interfere, that the people of New York will be treated with a series of sand-lot entertainments, after the manner of Dennis Kearney. It is announced by means of postal cards, hand-bills and otherwise, that, commencing on the evening of June 28th, and to be continued until Saturday evening, during the summer, a "citizens' committee" will preside over the public meetings of "labor reformers," to be held in Union Square. According to announcement, a new constitution for New York on the California plan, without the Chinese and coin clauses, will be discussed by local and national speakers. There are to be no leaders but the people; no party but voters. A greenback and working-men's platform will be advocated, and all citizens are invited. This is the programme so far as announced.

Pacific Mail and the Railroads.

NEW YORK, June 20.—Russell

Sage has not accepted the director ship of the Pacific mail. If the interests of the Union Pacific railroad and the steamship companies are to be antagonistic, he will stick to the railroad company. He says that the efforts of the Pacific Mail management to obtain a new arrangement with the Union Pacific had thus far accomplished nothing, and his impression is that the new constitution of California precludes any such pooling arrangement. Mr. Huntington will return to this city the latter part of the present week, and will then go to California to investigate the matter. Failing to make an arrangement with the Union Pacific, the Pacific Mail has given notice to the Panama railroad that it will no longer pay fixed freight charges of \$60,000 to the Panama road, but will take the alternative of its contract with that company of running its vessels weekly from New York, instead of semi-monthly as heretofore. Under this alternative the steamship company has to pay the railroad 25 per cent of its gross earnings for transferring its cargoes. The Pacific Mail fleet is not large enough, however, to make weekly sailings from New York, and the company will have to purchase, or charter, three more vessels in order to carry out the programme. The probabilities are against the purchase. The meeting held yesterday was understood to be relative to chartering vessels for that purpose.

—Perhaps the upper Columbia can't ship anything but hides, pelts, fossil-rock, etc. The steamer R. R. Thompson, on the down trip Friday, from the Dalles, bore the largest freight ever carried by a steamer in Oregon. It consisted of 254 tons of wool and 42 tons of flour. Of this lot 324 tons of wool came from above Celilo by the steamer Harvest Queen, and the officers of that vessel report 720 bales at various landings between Celilo and Wallula, awaiting shipment.
