## TELEGRAPHIC.

### EASTERN STATES.

**Ocean Freight Rates from New York to San Francisco.**  
 NEW YORK, June 23.—The Pacific Mail company this morning gave notice that they were prepared to name through rates on freights from New York to San Francisco via the isthmus, and that they would dispatch three steamers per month, viz: on the 10th, 20th and 30th. The rates named are \$3 per 100 pounds for first-class freight, \$2 for second-class, \$1 50 for third-class and \$1 for fourth or special class. This announcement was not unexpected and created no surprise, as it is the general opinion that it will not last, but that a new deal will be had with the railroads.

**A Loud Pic-nic near Chicago.**  
 CHICAGO, June 23.—The Lehr and Wehr Verein, which held a pic-nic yesterday outside the city, made no effort on their return to release prisoners, as was feared. It seems that the pic-nic was given by a Bohemian Sunday school, and that a numerous gang of drunken roughts had all along given considerable trouble, until finally those in charge of matters sent for the Sharpshooters as a protection. They arrived at about three o'clock, and shortly after that time trouble began as related. The lieutenant to-night denies that he gave the order to fire, but says that after he had cleared the grounds by a bayonet charge there was such a rain of stones and sticks that his men began a desultory fire without orders. The members of the company all refuse to talk; 17 are detained, the others having been released. The arrival of the police to conduct them to the station probably saved them from personal violence, which was threatened by the surrounding excited mob of about 2000.

**Gen. Sully's Heirs**  
 WASHINGTON, June 23.—A story comes from Dakota, to the effect that a half-breed daughter of the late Gen. Sully, now living at White Swan's village, and a member of the Sioux tribe, will be the rightful heir of his property, Sully, it is said, left a valuable estate in Philadelphia; also considerable accumulation of money. It is stated that he had no lawful wife, or other issue but this daughter, Julia, a tall, handsome girl, but wholly uneducated, at present making her home in the family of Collins Lamont, a man of mixed blood, and that steps are about being taken to establish her right to the fortune. The marriage of Sully to her mother, according to the Indian fashion, is stated to be susceptible of proof. It is certainly true that Sully, like a good many officers of the army, including Jeff. Davis and one or two generals now very high in command left illegitimate children among the Indians, and it is well known on the Missouri river that one or two handsome girls, nearly white, living in camp on little Pheasant until a short time since, have been considered Sully's children.

—A glass of whisky sells for a dime, and is drunk in a minute, says Bro. Merry, of the Dalles Inland Empire. It fires the brain, and deranges and weakens the physical system. On the same table lies a newspaper. It is covered with half a million type; it brings intelligence from the four quarters of the globe. The newspaper costs less than half the glass of grog; but it is none the less true that there is a large number of people who think whisky cheap, and newspapers dear.

—Mining operations have suspended by the Northern Pacific Railroad company at Wilkeson, and the pumps withdrawn. It seems that under the late management the work was ill advisedly commenced, and carried forward. General Sprague at once made an examination of the mines and works and, as a consequence, suspended operations.

### New York to Get One

*New York World June 17th.*  
 We have the great satisfaction of informing our readers that negotiations, begun at the instance of the World eighteen months ago, for the purpose of securing to the city of New York the grand obelisk now standing at Alexandria in Egypt, have been brought to a successful termination, and that His Highness, the Khedive, has most graciously and liberally offered this magnificent monument to the great commercial metropolis of the new world. The official papers announcing the success of these negotiations have been received at the State Department, and the necessary arrangements for bringing the obelisk here and setting it up in some conspicuous public place, to be an ornament and an honor to the city forever, having been long ago provided for by the splendid liberality of a single citizen of New York, the business details of the transfer will be prosecuted with all proper and possible celerity.

—Paschal Plant of Baltimore, is reported to have invented a machine for separating gold from earth or gravel without the use of water. This has been a desideratum to gold miners for many years. Several of his machines have been shipped to California.

—At a meeting of the Paris municipality a few days ago attention was called to a Catholic edition of "Uncle Tom's Cabin," copies of which had been distributed as prizes even in a secular school, containing notes, according to which slavery is not contrary to natural order, and some laborers would be happier if slaves. An assurance was given that such works would be expunged from the prize catalogue.
