TELEGRAPHIC.

EASTERN STATES.

Privateering on the Pacific.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—The secretary of war having been informed that Bolivia has decreed an issue of letters of marque with authority to privateers to seize Chilean property in neutral vessels, and that agents of Bolivia have departed for the United States, collectors of customs are requested to see that section 5290 of the revised statutes be vigilantly enforced against all vessels that appear to be destined to violate the neutrality laws of the United States.

Mormon Stock Advancing.

SALT LAKE CITY, June 24.—By a private dispatch from Geo. Q. Cannon to John Taylor it is learned that the United States marshal of Nebraska has been ordered to return the polygamous Reynolds to Utah. This trifling with a church convict disgraces the Gentiles, who think that the government is endeavoring to spoil all the good that has already been accomplished by the conviction and encourage Mormons in the belief that they are still above law. Reynolds will probably be confined in the Utah penitentiary until he is finally pardoned by a too lenient president, whose leniency will only be construed into cowardice by the Mormons.

Gagging the Press.

BERLIN, June 24.—Bismarck has forbidden the circulation in the empire of the Stormbell, a Russian revolutionary organ, published in Geneva.

The Royal Dead.

LONDON, June 23.—Queen Victoria, accompanied by Princess Beatrice and Prince Leopold, visited the Empress Eugenie at Chiselhurst to-day. The Queen had an hours interview with Eugenie. It is officially announced that the German court will go into mourning one week for the late prince imperial.

PACIFIC COAST NEWS.

Another Horrible Outrage Near Wheatland, California.

WHEATLAND, Cal., June 23.—The town to-day was thrown into an excitement by a report that a brutal outrage had been committed by a tramp on a woman named Mrs. McCullen. When found she was in a dying condition. The scene of the affair is located on the Sacramento wagon road, about ten miles distant. Mrs. McCullen was a Canadian woman, aged about thirty years. The particulars are as follows: A tramp came to the house, and finding that she was alone asked her for something to eat. While she was preparing it for him, he made an assault upon her person. She made a desperate resistance, but without success, after which he made his escape. She was in a delicate condition, and the excitement that she underwent, and the brutal treatment she received, had a terrible effect upon her. When found it was thought she was in a dying condition. On Friday last she gave birth to a dead child. On Saturday she died. Mr. McCullen is engaged in the drover business, and was absent in the mountains when the outrage was committed.

The imports of colonial wool into England, have doubled during the last fifteen years, and now amount to about 400,000,000 pounds. Half of this is re-exported to the continent. The home clip of this once staple commodity of England—on which the Lord Chancellor is supposed to be seated—is now of great secondary importance.

The Great Northern Pacific Railroad.

With all the misfortunes which have overtaken the Northern Pacific railroad since its inception, it gains a little every year. Its origin was wholly speculative. It had an immense land grant which covered a great deal of poor land. The termini on lake Superior and Puget-sound were mere paper towns, prospectively important, but of little consequence just now. The company has a little strip of 600 miles completed, viz: Duluth to Bismarck, 449 miles, and from Kalama, on the Columbia river, to Tacoma, on Puget-sound, 134 miles; total, 583 miles. Then the company has a lease for 99 years of 136 miles from Brainard to St. Paul, so that it is now operating more than seven hundred miles of railroad. That is certainly a substantial beginning, a far more tangible one than the Texas Pacific railroad ever made under Scott. The Northern Pacific has also about two hundred miles of road under contract on the Pacific side. Early in the next season this company will have a thousand miles of its own road completed and in operation. The location of this road is too remote from California to have much effect on business here. But its steady progress is an interesting fact. The discovery of important mines in Dakota, the great wheat region of the Northwest, and the steady stream of immigration in that direction, are all powerful stimulants to the construction of this road.
