This country is a good stock range, but the time has come when some provision must be made for feeding stock in the winter. The gentleman stated that he is going to erect a fine hotel at Blalocks station immediately, and he had delayed only on account of the non-arrival of his lumber. Besides this, the reporter learned that the railroad company intended erecting a fine depot and warehouse there. While waiting for the train the reporter made the acquaintance of Mr. Pierson, a gentleman who has located a farm to the east of the Blalock place, and he fully substantiated Mr. Griffins views in relation to the inducements for settlers to locate in this county. He has experimented to his entire satisfaction, and said he would not exchange for a large number of acres in the Wallawalla country. This gentleman, like Mr. Griffin, heartily encourages immigration, and thinks there is no more suitable location in the state. Of late we have been in receipt of numerous letters from the east, asking for information in regard to immigrating to Oregon, particularly Wasco county. We desire to give only the most authentic information on this subject, bence our interview with Mr. Griffin, a gentleman of well known integrity, besides being thoroughly posted in matters of this kind.


