Apologetic.

In consequence of removal of machinery and materials from one floor to another in THE ASTORIAN building yesterday, to better accommodate our work, the paper this morning is not quite up to the standard of excellence.

Wheat and Freights.

We are indebted to Messrs. Rodgers, Meyer & Co. for a copy of their monthly circular, which contains a carefully prepared estimate of the stock of wheat remaining in California on the first of January, which we reprint below:

This statement is of particular value at the present time, as it gives a starting point from which can be figured out with approximate correctness the deficiency in the tonnage supply. We therefore, repeat the statement published in our issue of the 22d of December, correcting the tonnage statistics to date, and using the above statement instead of the loose estimates heretofore published.

From this amount must be deducted the quantity used for seeding, local consumption, etc., for which purposes 200,000 tons is a liberal allowance, and it is therefore evident that there are in round numbers 390,000 tons of wheat available in California for export, for which tonnage cannot possibly be obtained during the current crop year.

Yankee Success.

The British Trade Journal, in a recent issue has an item entitled the secret of Yankee success, which has some very sensible observations upon what was seen by a special correspondent of that paper. It says: "The Americans have, as a matter of fact, gone far ahead of all other countries in this respect, and have had to educate, as it were, some of their national customers up to their superior knowledge. A French firm, for example, sent to America for a certain style of pitchfork. They were made to suit the requirements of the customer, who, however, did not want them, because they were lighter than he had ordered. The response was 'you have the strength you require, what more do you want.' The truth was the French customer had retained the idea that there could be no strength unless the article was heavy and clumsy looking, and it was not until they found out the truth that had been proved by American experience, that they consented to adopt the light forks. The same truth is now being manifested in England by the recent introduction of American small agricultural tools, the shipment of which, I am told, is this year largely increasing. The question is, will the Englishmen consent to take a leaf out of an American book?"

The Cincinnati Enquirer says that "Senator John P. Jones, of Nevada, is the ablest and wisest man on all questions of finance in the senate, and is capable of teaching all congress on these questions." This is a high compliment to pay to a member of so illustrious a body of men as the United States senate, and is doubtless inspired by the thorough study Mr. Jones has given the question of bi-metalism, of which the Enquirer is an ardent advocate. It is admitted, however, that Senator Jones has not only gone deeper into the principles involved in the single gold standard position than any other public man in this country, but that he can teach many foreign writers on finance on their chosen subject. The battle over silver must soon be fought, and the immense interests arrayed against it will furnish occasion for good work on the part of its advocates.

What pleasure it is to pay one's debts! In the first place, it removes that uneasiness which a person feels from dependence and obligation. It affords gratification to the creditor, and therefore gratifies our social affection. It promotes that future confidence which is so interesting to an honest mind. It opens a prospect of being readily supplied with what you want on future occasions. It leaves a consciousness of our virtue; and it is a measure we know to be right, both in point of justice and sound economy. Finally, it is the main support of simple reputation. Pay us, that we may pay others.

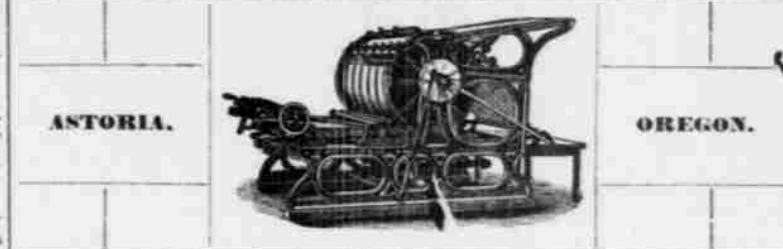
