The Durham, the last of the fleet in Baker's bay, went to sea yesterday morning.

After several days delay the Geo. Harley proceeded to sea yesterday, bound for San Francisco.

Again it has turned cold, but how long it will last we are not advised by the weather clerk.

Miss Springer, who has been on a visit to this city, left for her home in Portland yesterday morning.

The British bark Ceraster came down on Sunday in tow of the Ockham, Capt. Pense piloting.

The tug Edith brought the schooner Sparrow down to Knappa on Sunday in charge of Capt. Reed. She will load lumber for San Francisco.

One of the largest swan we have heard of in this vicinity was killed near Knappa recently by Mr. Dan Sutherland. It measured nine feet, and weighed thirty-five pounds.

Jack Grant was arrested by officer Schlin last evening, but resisted and succeeded in making his escape before reaching the jail. He was again found about half past eight and securely locked up.

Dr. J. C. Hawthorne, of East Portland, was stricken with paralysis on Saturday evening last, with but slight hopes for his recovery. He remains speechless and partially unconscious, and the physicians have given up all hope.

The Ryvalde was docked at Flavel's wharf on Sunday, where she is discharging tin. She brings 12,010 boxes tin plate, 19,850 fire brick, 400 casks cement and 450 tons salt, consigned to Rodgers, Meyer & Co.

Another wedding is soon to take place. This time we learn that the home of one of upper Astoria's enterprising citizens will be changed from that of a bachelor to that of a happy twain whose solitude will be shared in blissfulness.

Several buoys have been carried away along the river during the recent high waters. We understand they will not be again placed in position until the water recedes, there being sufficient water in the river now to admit of vessels of any size passing up or down with perfect safety.

Hope B. Ferguson, esq., formerly of this city, but now a prominent attorney in Patna city, has purchased another farm in that desirable bunch grass country and will engage extensively in stock raising under the firm name of Ferguson & Lundy. Hope is enterprising and will certainly reap a harvest of prosperity.

The new pulpmeter on exhibition at the works of Messrs. Arndt & Fenchon, the agents, has been purchased by Mr. Joseph Hume, who will place it in his new cannery, when completed, for fire and other purposes. The pulpmeter is, without doubt, the best steam pump manufactured, and we predict they will be extensively employed by different parties throughout the city.

The large number of valentines sold at the book stores indicate that St. Valentine's day was well remembered in this city yesterday. The pretty conceit of men and maidens sending valentines to their sweethearts, is an old custom and one that is largely indulged in on this coast. The evening was enlivened by several select parties and a dance at Liberty hall.

First Spring Salmon of the Season.

Mr. Jas. B. La Du sends us the following from Mount Coffin under date of 14th inst., which is especially worthy of mention and is probably an indication that the salmon season of 1881 will not be retarded: "Two young men, Messrs. W. H. Bun and C. L. Fowler, fishing here for silver salmon with a set net were much surprised on visiting one of their nets on Saturday last, 12th inst., to find therein a genuine spring salmon, but thinking perhaps they might be mistaken the fish was shown during the day to a number of the fishermen in this vicinity and pronounced by them to be a spring salmon. Mt. Coffin therefore claims the honor of taking first spring salmon in 1881, as far as heard from."

Mr. H. B. Parker is in Portland on business.

The schooner Argonaut sailed from San Francisco for Shoalwater bay on Saturday last.

A large portion of the crib work put in near the mouth of the Coquille by Capt. Parker was carried away by the late high waters.

The Coast Mail says: In the vicinity of Empire city at this season, the cattle stand in the water belly deep and pick up seaweed that drifts in from the ocean. It is said that the Chinamen use the same weed as an article of food.

The Lizaie Iredale arrived at Honolulu, from Liverpool, January 14th in a passage of 154 days and will soon be due here. She had twenty laborers of various European nationalities for the Kilauea plantations of Kauai.

A performance was given at The Dalles last evening for the benefit of the Episcopal church by The Dalles Dramatic society, in which Prof. Worthington, formerly principal of the public schools of this city, personated General Grant in the drama of "Enlisted for the War."

The construction of a large three-masted schooner will be immediately commenced on Coos bay, about half of which will be owned there. The vessel will be 134 feet long, thirty-four feet beam and eleven feet depth of hold. About one-half of the vessel will be owned on Coos bay.

Messrs. Bothwick & McKennon, of the Cascade locks, have made an assignment of their effects for the benefit of creditors. Some days ago the property of the firm was destroyed by fire, and they offered to make a settlement of fifty cents on the dollar, but some of the creditors refused to accede to such terms. The liabilities of the firm are \$11,000, with about \$7,000 assets.

The barkentine North Bend, Capt. Perryman, arrived yesterday in tow of the tug Columbia and was docked at G. W. Hume's Main street wharf, where she will discharge her entire cargo consisting of 299 bales hay, 500 brick, 759 packages of merchandise, and 100 packages machinery, consigned respectively to Knappa mills, Occident packing company, G. W. Hume and H. B. Parker. The machinery is for a new stern wheel steamer which will soon be constructed by Mr. Parker, to engage in the trade of this vicinity. About 170 bales hay are for Capt. J. H. D. Gray. As soon as the North Bend has discharged all her freight she will proceed to Knappa to load lumber for San Francisco, and not go up river.

Parker has decided to take the machinery out of the sunken Gusie Telfair, and with that view he proceeded to Portland to get some apparatus which he had there, which he will bring by way of San Francisco. He will probably arrive by the next steamer prepared to go to work. The captain has had a large experience in that kind of business, and we may look for him to make a success of it.

Capt. D. E. Buchanan has gone to San Francisco under orders from Col. G. L. Gillespie, to buy or make arrangements to build a staunch sea-going tug for the use of the government in harbor improvements south of the Columbia river. Heretofore the engineers' department has depended on private tugs, which could often-times not be secured when most needed, and important work consequently was delayed. The new tug will be used the coming summer in the improvements of Yaquina and Coquille, and in surveying the Columbia river bar.
