Sibirskoff Heard From.

A friend in this city is in receipt of a Scandinavian journal of late date which contains a dispatch announcing the safe arrival of Capt. Sibirskoff, which, translated, reads as follows:

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 11.—News from Capt. Sibirskoff, of the steamer Oscar Dickson, for whose safety so much anxiety has been felt, has at last arrived. A telegram from Tobalsk to Prof. Nordenskjold announces the safe arrival of the expedition at that city after an eventful passage.

Tillamook Items.

An occasional correspondent at Garibaldi, under date of 15th inst., sends us the following Tillamook items:

The schooner Kate L. Herron arrived to-day at one o'clock, P. M.

The body of a man named Weatherby, formerly a resident of Nehalem, was found on the banks of the Kitchies river a few days ago. He had been drowned in attempting to cross the river on horseback during a heavy freshet.

Latest telegrams indicated that navigation on the upper Columbia would be suspended yesterday. However, there is no telling how soon the weather might change.

The trial of Dimitry Sepagan in the United States Circuit-court at Portland, on a charge of making and selling hoochene in Alaska, contrary to law, resulted in a disagreement of the jury, after being out several hours. All the other defendants have pleaded guilty to the charge.

The new steamer being built at Shoalwater bay will be launched in about three or four weeks. The machinery has arrived from San Francisco and is now being placed in the hull. She is about the size of the Rip Van Winkle, and will be a powerful boat for her size.

In Yakima county, Washington territory, two ledges of the free quartz have been worked with the most primitive appliances, yielding \$18 per ton at the croppings and reaching \$42 at the depth of 60 feet. These ledges show to be of uniform width and what is better, demonstrate the presence of no refractory metal. As that region is almost entirely unprospected, it is fair to infer that better ledges are yet to be discovered. The long dry season in that section is invaluable to the prospector and will yet insure to the benefit of the eastern slope and its people.

Cost of the Census.

Taking a census is a costly thing to the government, and is becoming more so at the end of each decade. It is an expense, however, which is entirely legitimate, and cannot be avoided. Fortunately, it occurs only once in ten years. Superintendent Walker gives out that the exact figures of the cost of the census for 1880 are \$2,080,000, or about four cents a head for every man, woman and child. The printing of the document will add a considerable sum to this amount; but there is a vast amount of valuable matter in the census, besides the mere enumeration of the country's population. This will afford compensation for the outlay.
