—The schooner Sparrow went to sea yesterday.
—The Archer will be taken down to bar anchorage to-day.
—The steamer State of California will sail hence to-morrow.
—The steamer Oregon sailed from San Francisco for this port yesterday.
—Meeting of Alert Hook and Ladder company this evening.
—Hon. W. D. Hare and Hon. C. W. Fulton returned to the city last evening.
—A social party will be given at the Central hotel on Monday evening next.
—The schooner Trustee sailed from San Francisco for this port on Thursday last.
—The Catholics of Walla-walla contemplate the building of a church that will cost \$15,000.
—Besides an unusual amount of local talent, Astoria has two brass bands which are equal to any in the state.
—Mr. Wooden, the Nehalem mail carrier, did not arrive in the city yesterday on account of sickness. Mr. Walker carried the mail in his stead.
—A little child of Mr. Wooden, of Nehalem, who was seriously scalded by falling into a tub of hot water about ten days ago, is rapidly recovering.
—The schooner City of Astoria took on board yesterday, at Flavel's dock, a lot of lumber, tin, etc., for J. Williams & Co., and proceeded to Tancy point.
—Carl Hoffman, a German, who was adjudged insane by the County-court of Clatsop county, was taken to the asylum at East Portland a few days ago by Mr. C. Leinenweber.
—Messrs. Rohr and Davidson have the contract for moving Mr. C. H. Page's building from Hume's mill to the lot adjoining the city book store. Work on the foundation was commenced yesterday.
—Mr. W. G. Ross' new building at the head of Cass street, is nearly completed and presents an elegant appearance. It has a fine elevation and one of the best views in the city. When completed it will be occupied by Mr. John Fox.
—We regret to announce anything detrimental to the superiority of the Astoria Rifle club, but nevertheless it becomes our duty to record some brilliant shooting by Mrs. Wm. Hume, of Eagle Cliff, who recently vanquished one of the crack shots of this city in a trial at off-hand shooting. Mrs. Hume is undoubtedly the best lady shot on this coast, and as far as we can learn is equal to the best gentleman in this popular pleasure.
—The Dore's society, a new order for the young folk, was organized in this city on Thursday evening last, with about fifteen charter members. Both sexes, not less than fifteen and not exceeding the age of thirty-five years, are eligible to membership. We regret, however, that a complaint has been filed by several members of the sterner sex, that the order was not legally organized. It has therefore been decided that at the next regular meeting the society will be reorganized and carried out to the satisfaction of all.

—Louise, a little daughter of C. H. Memmendorfer, of East Portland, died of scarlet fever on Thursday evening last.
—The steamer California arrived at Port Townsend on Thursday from San Francisco, with miners and mining experts on board for Sitka.
—Cattle all along the Snake and Columbia rivers are dying by hundreds, and thousands have already turned up their heads to the daisies.
—The case of J. M. Shively, appellant, vs. W. W. Parker and J. Q. A. Bowley respondents, is on trial at the present term of the Supreme-court at Salem.
—M. C. Crosby has just sold and delivered to M. Nowlen, four thousand feet of galvanized iron water pipe, three thousand of which is two inch pipe. The people of Astoria will not go thirsty the coming summer.
—We ask our friends in the various parts of the county to send us all items of news relating to events transpiring in their vicinity. Such favors are highly appreciated by us, and they assist in making our report of local events more complete than it can possibly be made otherwise.
—The steam tug Alina has been sold to the government at a figure approaching \$15,000. She is to be used for surveying purposes on the Columbia river, Yaquina bay, etc., and will be got in readiness and sail for this place as soon as possible.
—A young lady, after being shown through a printing office by her young man, told him that the power press arrangement suggested the most pleasant thoughts. And the "mini" looked from the m-braces to her wasp like waist, and said he preferred the old-fashioned hand-press.
—The weather at Yakima city has been terrible. We are informed that during the late freshet all the bridges over the Yakima were washed away, and since that time two feet more of snow has fallen. Fuel is very scarce, as high as fifteen cents having been paid for rails for fire-wood. The country there is almost depopulated of stock, and their skeletons can be found in every roadway.
—This is the closing day of the extensive auction sale continued from day to day since a week ago at Holden's auction rooms. There will be an afternoon sale at two o'clock, and at seven o'clock in the evening. Mr. Frank Keeler the inimitable auctioneer, will close out the odds and ends of the large stock of sundries brought to this city, and offer his valedictory to the Astoria public, expecting to go to Portland on Sunday on the ocean steamer.
—In a recent issue of the Oakland Weekly Times is presented a beautiful word-picture of Oakland from the pen of Calvin B. MacDonald, a well known journalist and lecturer on the Pacific coast. The Times remarks: "It has never been equalled by any of the eloquent writers who have from time to time chosen this for their theme. No other man in California can write such an article, and it will be a rare treat for the readers of the Times."
—On Monday, the 14th inst., the residence of Mr. Thos. Slusher, about four miles above Dufur's, in Wasco county, was burned with its contents. Mr. James Tiffin, an old man aged ninety-four years, was at the house during the fire, and in removing goods got severely burned. Every attention was given Mr. Tiffin, but on Wednesday morning last about five o'clock, he passed to the other world. He was a kind, good old man, and respected by all who knew him. It is peculiarly sad that one living to such a ripe old age should come to his death by an accident.
—Newton Miller, aged 22 years, had the meta-tarsal articulation or instep joint of both feet amputated at The Dalles recently, by Drs. Logan & Richardson, assisted by Dr. O. D. Downe. The young man got his feet frozen on the 6th of last December, near Rockville, in Wasco county. He, in company with his employer, went to Rockville on the evening of December 5th. Late at night they attempted to return home, some six miles distant, and on the way young Miller fell in a fit by the roadside (as he says) where he lay until next morning, when he went to the nearest house. His companion was unable to carry him, and at night was unsuccessful in finding any one to help. The night's exposure resulted in his feet being frozen as above stated, and in order to save his life, it was found necessary to have them amputated.

In the morning a representation of the fact was made to Mr. Keeler and although it was impossible to prove the actual receipt of the ten dollars except from the lady's word, Mr. Keeler left the matter to Mr. Holden's decision, he being acquainted with the party, and the balance claimed as due was immediately returned.
