—The schooner Trustee, from San Francisco, arrived yesterday.

—Very little sickness prevails in this vicinity at the present time.

—The American ship Alice Beck, is loading at New York for this port.

—The ship Canada, from New York, is outside with pilot on board.

—The Spanish bark Odalia sailed from Stanley, F. I., January 2d, for this port, via Victoria.

—We received a pleasant call on Sunday from Mr. J. C. Waldron, late editor of the Amador (Cal.) Times.

—Nineteen canneries will be in active operation the coming season between Tongue point and the mouth of the river.

—Mr. Alexander Guthrie, of the firm of Balfour, Guthrie & Co., Liverpool, was a passenger by the outgoing steamer State of California.

—Why not organize a literary society in Astoria. It would be very instructive and interesting, besides affording considerable amusement.

—The British bark Badura came in Saturday evening and anchored near fort Stevens. Yesterday she came up to harbor anchorage in tow of the Brenham.

—The regular meetings of Temple lodge No. 7, A. F. and A. M., have been changed to the first and third Saturday of each month instead of Tuesday as heretofore.

—As will be seen by notice in another column, Messrs. C. H. Bain & Co. have secured proposals for the construction of a two story building. The building will adjoin the present works of Messrs. Bain & Co., and will be 40x50 feet, to be used in connection with their works.

—A very pleasant surprise was tendered Miss Maud Hobson last evening by her many friends and admirers. A large number of young ladies and gentlemen met at the residence of Mr. N. Loeb, and proceeded en masse to the residence of Hon. C. W. Fulton, taking Miss Maud completely by surprise. It was indeed a pleasant affair.

—Sunday was a very disagreeable day, and the tide rose to an unusual height. Several sidewalks were inundated by the excessive rains. The gentle zephyr, which lasted all day, made merry havoc, ruthlessly scattering signs, unceremoniously tossing umbrellas, and wrapping about them most uncomfortably the overcoats of unfortunate travelers.

—Improvements at upper Astoria are being pushed forward with vigor, indicating lively times the coming season, and a good prospect for the future welfare of the town. Three new canneries will be added to the already large number which will be in active operation the coming season. The Occident Packing company have their new cannery nearly completed. Messrs. C. Timmons and company and Messrs. S. D. Adair and company have commenced work and will build immediately. The Astoria box and lumber manufacturing company have their new mill completed and will commence sawing to-day. Many other improvements are going on which are creditable to the place.

Death of Lyman P. Hall.

In the San Francisco Chronicle of the 25th inst., we find the following account of the drowning of Lyman P. Hall, of Astoria:

SWEPT INTO THE SEA.
Lyman P. Hall, assistant engineer of the steamer Alex. Duncan, was drowned on the 20th inst. at Moro bay. He was one of a party of four gathering mussels on Moro rock, when, contrary to advice, he left the party to go to a small rock in advance, when a heavy sea swept him into the current, which is very swift, and thence to the ocean. The boat being some distance off much time was lost before assistance could be rendered. At the risk of their lives the chief engineer, E. Wassing, and purser, George H. Bradshaw, followed him a mile from shore and recovered the body, but too late to save life. As it was impossible to obtain any necessary appliances for transporting the remains to this city, they were buried at Moro.

Mr. Hall was a pioneer of Oregon, having come to this state in 1851. He emigrated from Peoria, Illinois, where he was born and had lived up to the time of his departure for this coast. He was by occupation an engineer, in which capacity he served for many years on the Columbia river, until about six months ago, since which time he had been employed on the steamer Alex. Duncan until his death. As near as we could ascertain he was about fifty-seven years of age. His father still resides at Peoria, Illinois. He was a son-in-law of Mr. Job Ross of this city, and leaves a wife and five children to mourn his loss.

—There are 188 prisoners now in the penitentiary at Salem.

—Mr. J. W. Strange has assumed permanent control of the editorial and local columns of the Roseburg Plaindealer.

—A valuable stallion died in a struggle on the trip of the Oregon from San Francisco. The horse was valued at \$1,800.

—The Oregonian of yesterday says: "A heavy, warm rain has prevailed with slight interruptions for thirty hours ending at midnight. From six a. m. to six p. m. yesterday, the river rose two feet seven inches, and from six to midnight, at the rate of three inches per hour."

—We have just received a copy of the Pataha city Spirit, published weekly by G. C. M. Hammond. It is a six column paper and published entirely at home. Among its advertisements we notice the cards of Caples & Ferguson, attorneys at law, and O. M. Osborne, justice of the peace, collector and conveyancer. The Spirit says: "At the last meeting of the Washington guards, Mr. H. B. Ferguson was elected president." Mr. Ferguson and Mr. Osborne are both old time residents of Astoria, and young men of considerable ability.

—The Walla-walla Watchman is authority for the following: "A rising young lawyer of Pataha city, while out in the country, courting a lovely farmers daughter, offered to make himself useful as well as ornamental about milking time. He knew all about it, he said, and in his zeal and eagerness to ingratiate himself into the old folk's favor, he tried to milk a two year old heifer!" It was then he flew over the fence without touching the top rail and at last accounts was spitting blood. The bovine, being fat enough to kill, was sold to the butcher on the next day for beef. We hope, however, he may recover without serious injury.

An occasional correspondent of THE ASTORIAN, writing from Woodward's landing, Washington territory, under date of February 16th, sends us items as follows:

Messrs. John Wood and company and E. K. Patterson, the builder, are now engaged in placing machinery in their new steamer. She will be launched about March 1st.

The late freshest brought down nearly all the logs on the Willapa river and tributaries, about three million of which have been rafted and delivered.

Messrs. John Wood and company are adding to their steam saw mills a gang edger, besides other valuable improvements, which will add greatly to the cutting capacity of the works. Messrs. Wood and company think that by this addition the mills will cut fifty thousand feet more per day than formerly.

Many farmers are coming here from California and other places for the purpose of settling, and are making considerable improvements.

The winter in this section has been very mild so far. Stockmen are killing a great many beef off the tide land.

This place is much in want of a flouring mill, and a dairy. With such facilities for both as are here offered, it is a wonder it has so long been neglected.
