—Steamer day to-morrow.  
—No vessels in port yesterday.  
—Epinosa Concert company to night.  
—J. Strauss' new advertisement will appear to-morrow.  
—The steamship Columbia sailed from San Francisco for this port yesterday.  
—Mr. P. A. Trullinger, formerly of this city, has returned and intends remaining.  
—The steamer Westport conveyed considerable freight to Hungry harbor yesterday.  
—Rescue Engine company was out with their elegant Sibley last evening for the first drill in several months. The Sibley always proves that she is not to be excelled by any.  
—Presbyterian church services Sunday 11 A. M. and 7:30 P. M. Sacrament of the Lord's Supper in connection with morning service. Preparatory service to-day at 2 P. M.  
—A very few fishing boats went out on Thursday night, and but a few salmon were brought in yesterday morning. One boat caught as high as fifteen salmon and others caught none.  
—John Rodgers, of the Central market, corralled about all the salmon that were caught by the fishermen on Thursday night, and it being Lent, he had no difficulty in disposing of them at ten cents a pound.  
—Mr. H. B. Parker has eighteen men busily at work every day on his new steamboat and the work is being rapidly pushed. Caulkers have been engaged and will commence their part of the work on Tuesday next.  
—Captain J. G. Hustler, who had one of his ribs fractured by a fall about a week ago, was out yesterday but was unable to reach his office and had to return home. He has also been suffering severely from rheumatism.  
—Amico Jaques, who was arrested by Chief Barry on the last trip of the Oregon for assaulting George Vamila in August last, was tried before Justice Fox and bound over in the sum of \$300 to await the action of the grand jury at the next term of the Circuit court.  
—The last trip of the steamship Oregon is pronounced by officers and passengers to be one of the pleasantest she has ever made. The weather was fine and the sea smooth beyond precedent. It was well this was the case for she had the heaviest cargo she ever carried, and the unusually large number of 460 passengers.  
—Mr. D. J. Ingalls of Lewis and Clarke was in the city yesterday. Dan is supervisor of road district number twelve and reports his experience in collecting taxes from Chinamen in that locality very discouraging. He first ordered them to work on the roads, but they refused to either work or pay. He then attached their goods and finally compelled the celestials to liquidate.  
—There are some malicious scamps in Astoria who deserve to be dealt with according to law. Night before last some infamous wretch cut the rail of Mr. H. B. Parker's new steamer in such a manner that it will be necessary to replace it by another. We hear of another instance where one placed his knife on one end of a net rack and followed along until the other end was reached, cutting the net in two. Such malevolent persons should be severely punished for their mischievous work.

First Salmon of the Season.

Mr. Wm. Hume, of Eagle Cliff, one of the pioneer cannerymen on the Columbia river, again makes the first shipment of salmon packed on the river. Yesterday, the first day of the season, Mr. Hume packed sixty-five cases of salmon which will come down by the Bonita this afternoon for shipment by the Oregon.

The Concert Company.

This evening the Epinosa Concert company announce one of their select concerts at Liberty hall in this city, and from the number of reserved seats already secured we may feel safe in saying the house will be crowded. Everywhere throughout the state have they been well received and well spoken of by the press.

A Historic Steamer.

It will be remembered that some time ago the Oregon Railway and Navigation company bought the steamship Mississippi, and it was stated that she would be used in the Seattle coal trade. She will soon be on her way out, as her detention was occasioned by the putting in of new boilers only. The Mississippi has quite a history. She was built in Dunbarton, Scotland, in 1863, for a blockade runner and was captured at sea by the United States gunboat Magnolia. As a prize she was worth over \$500,000. The navy yard purchased her after condemnation and fitted her out as a cutter, putting a battery of seven guns on her. She was one of the vessels upon which the confederate ironclads made a raid in 1863. She was badly cut up in her spars and rigging. A shot from the Mississippi took effect on one of the pilot houses of an ironclad and wrecked it badly. She rendered excellent service until the end of the rebellion, when she was laid up in ordinary at New York, and on the 8th of June, 1869, she was sold at auction. She was altered, and for a time ran in the New Orleans trade, and latterly in the trade between Boston and the Western islands. She is 1,638 tons register, and has engines of 500 nominal horse power, and in withal, a very good and serviceable vessel for the trade she is to be employed in. She is a good carrier and has excellent passenger accommodations.

—Mr. A. Steeb has been appointed on the police force of this city.  
—The Belle of Oregon arrived at New York from Hongkong on the 31st ult.  
—The State of California arrived at San Francisco on Thursday, forty-eight hours from Portland. Good time.  
—Prof. J. P. Feaster's second term of writing school will commence next Monday evening at the Main street school house.  
—Two vessels, under full sail, crossed the bar yesterday evening but was unable to reach this port, hence we could not obtain the names.  
—Further particulars of the body found near Eagle cliff have reached us. The man had on two pair overalls, two red flannel shirts and fifty-five dollars were found in his pockets. No papers were found by which he could be identified. He was five feet, eleven inches in height. The body was conveyed to Cathlamet where a coroner's inquest was held and a verdict of accidental drowning was rendered by the jury. He was buried at Cathlamet. The body was in a condition which indicated that he was one of the unfortunates from the Clatsop Chief disaster, and supposed to be the fireman.  
—We are glad to learn that the little daughter of Mr. Geo. Hill, who was run over by the truck on Wednesday last, is progressing finely under the skillful care of Dr. Severn. Her escape from instant death may be considered almost miraculous. In commenting on this painful accident many have been inclined to censure the teamsters who allow the children to incur this dangerous risk by permitting them to jump on the truck for a ride; but on inquiry we have ascertained that the teamsters are not so much to blame as it would appear. The rumbling noise made by the trucks as they pass over the planked streets renders it next to impossible for the drivers to hear the little noise the children make in jumping on and off, and, besides, it is always necessary for them to keep a lookout ahead and not behind. Parents should strictly forbid their children from following this dangerous practice, and if they hear of their disobeying their injunctions they should not be slow in punishing them for disobedience.  
—Dr. John Welch, dentist, will be at the incident hotel in this city about the 20th inst., and remain a short time for the practice of his profession.

Fraudulent Salmon Labels.

It would seem to us that all our Columbia river salmon cannerymen ought to combine in a prompt and energetic effort to put a stop to the pernicious and deceitful practice of those unprincipled sharpers in California and elsewhere, who fraudulently speculate upon the superior reputation the Columbia river salmon has over all competitors. Surely there must be some law under which they can protect themselves, if not it is high time some such law was enacted.

We were recently shown an illuminated label on which was printed "Fresh Columbia River Salmon. Columbia Packing company. A Lusk & Co., agents, San Francisco, California." Trade mark, a Goddess of Freedom on a pedestal and the words "Columbia brand." This label is printed by M. Schmidt and company, place of residence not stated.

We could not ascertain that any company known as the "Columbia Packing company" was canning salmon on the Columbia river, unless it was the cannery at Fisherton. We therefore addressed a letter of inquiry to James Laidlaw, esp., and his reply, which we take the liberty to publish, fully confirms our suspicions that the label in question is a fraudulent one. Mr. Laidlaw writes:

DEAR SIR: I am in receipt of your letter of 26th inst, and in reply beg to say that our trade mark is a "thistle" and the style of our company is "The Columbia Canning company." Cutting and company pack at Eagle Cliff under the style "The Columbia River Packing company." I have by this mail received a copy of the label in question, from a correspondent in San Francisco who writes: "I inclose label of The Columbia Packing company, A. Lusk & Co., of this place, which is a fraud and in name rather cuts yours." The probability is that the label is intended to be used upon salmon packed in San Francisco. If so, such fraud should be exposed and I am surprised a firm like Lusk & Co., would lend their names to such a procedure. I have seen another similar label "Pioneer Fishery," Columbia River Fresh Salmon, Hughes & Co., agents, San Francisco; in fact I have a copy of this one also. While on this subject I may mention that our brand was pirated last year in England and salmon sold as "Thistle Brand," packed by H. Hume & Co., Fisherton, Washington territory, but I promptly discovered the printer, and stopped the sale of the labels. I am, Yours truly, JAMES LAIDLAW.

What can or should be done to put a stop to this unfair and injurious practice we are not prepared to say. We have done our duty in calling attention to and exposing it, and it remains for those who are more immediately interested in putting a stop to it to take the proper steps to do it effectually if possible.

—James Petty was arrested yesterday by Constable Henline for assault. He was tried before Justice Fox and fined five dollars, in default of payment of which he was committed to jail.

—The cow ordinance will now be strictly enforced. All cows not complying with the requirements of the ordinance will be taken in charge by the cow officer and if not redeemed, after due notice, will be sold.

—Mr. F. N. Shurtleff, collector of customs at Portland, has been officially notified from Washington that the appropriations for light, fuel, water, etc., are insufficient to meet the current expenses. He is authorized to incur no further expenditures after the 31st of March.

—Passengers from Portland make the trip to Walla-walla in one day less than do the mails. The reason is that passengers go through straight by steam, and the mails are dragged around two hundred miles or more out of the way by stage horse power under the original contract.

—In the state circuit court at Hillsboro Wednesday Henry Wintzingerode, condemned for the murder of Jacob Zwanger, pleaded guilty to murder in the second degree, which was accepted by the district attorney. His sentence, of course, will be imprisonment in the state penitentiary for life.
