Bishop Paddock, the new bishop of the new Episcopal diocese of Washington territory, arrived by the steamer yesterday with his family. He will reside in Seattle.

Mrs. Epperly of Portland, visiting in Astoria, is the guest of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Cardwell. Before returning to the metropolis Mrs. Epperly will visit Mr. and Mrs. Callender at Knappton.

Geo. M. Rowe, long connected with the Occident, goes to Tillamook rock as head keeper in place of Mr. Roeder, resigned. Keep a bright light George, and warn the mariner of the dangers of the bar.

Judge Deady's decision declaring the bridge across the Willamet, now in course of construction an unlawful structure, has made the East Portland people wild with rage, and mass meetings denouncing him are held.

The next trip of the Shubrick will be to the north, and very soon after that the buoys at the entrance to Shoalwater bay will receive attention. We advise our friends over that way to bide their time with patience, this is a large district having but on steam tender.

Mr. H. C. Leonard returned from New York yesterday. Mr. Leonard was in business in Astoria thirty years ago. Last fall when he heard of Hancock's election he paid his bets and took the first steamer. An attempt was made a few nights since to have a meeting of the Portland board of trade. A faithful few waited for nearly an hour but no quorum appearing, were compelled to adjourn. This reminds us of the time when it was a difficult matter to get a quorum of the Astoria Chamber of Commerce together. But those days are passed in Astoria let us hope forever.

Common Council Proceedings.

Council met in regular session April 12th, 1881, with Mayor D. C. Ireland presiding.

Councilmen present—Baker, Hahn, Hendington, Spexarth and Wright.

Absent—Sture.

Officers in attendance—R. H. Cardwell, auditor and clerk and W. J. Barry, chief of police, C. W. Fulton, city attorney.

The minutes of the last regular meeting read and approved.

PETITIONS.

From fruit and vegetable dealers in the city, asking the council to pass an ordinance requiring peddlers of fruit and vegetables to pay a license of ten dollars per quarter, was read and on motion referred to the committee on health and police.

From Arndt & Ferchen, asking the council to pay them the difference between the face and market value of warrants received by them for work on the city jail, amounting to \$176.50, was read and on motion referred to the committee on ways and means.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Report of committee on streets and public ways on the petition of property owners on West-eighth street, asking that the improvements at the foot of said street remain as they now are, was read and report adopted, and petition laid on the table.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS.

Report of Aug. Miller, city sexton for the month of March, 1881, was read and on motion ordered received and placed on file.

Report of Peter Runey police judge, for the month of March 1881, was read and on motion ordered received and placed on file.

Report of Thomas Logan superintendent of streets, for the month of March 1881, was read and ordered received and placed on file.

Report of W. E. Dement city treasurer, for the quarter ending March 31, 1881, was read and on motion referred to committee on ways and means.

ORDINANCES.

An ordinance to prohibit the carrying of carcasses of dead animals through the streets of the city was read the first and second time, and on motion referred to the committee on health and police.

An ordinance in relation to the assessment and collection of taxes was read the third time and passed.

The department is, however, as ready and willing to tackle the fiend as if it was paid for going to a fire every day."
