The Cows at Large.
 There has been up to this date filed with the auditor and clerk the description of thirty-seven cows belonging to different persons in the city, as provided for by ordinance 405. All who desire to keep a milk cow, and to have her run at large within the corporate limits of the city, who have not as yet filed description should do so immediately, as the ordinance will positively be enforced after this date. Following is a sample of the descriptions filed. If you do not understand how to make up the description call upon Dick, and he will fix it for you:
 To the Auditor and Clerk of the City of Astoria, Clatsop county, Oregon:
 The undersigned being a resident of the city of Astoria and living within the cow limits of said city, as expressed in ordinance 405 entitled an ordinance to prevent animals from running at large within certain limits of said city, desires to keep one milk cow and to have her run at large in accordance with said ordinance.
 The said cow is described as follows, to wit: Black cow with white spot in forehead, white belly and white bag, giving milk from three teats, medium size, one half Jersey stock, (which half I do not know), short horns, stand equal in length and spread uniformly at the tips. The said cow is about six years old, has fore-legs before, two legs behind and a tail, the extremity of which is interspersed with white hairs about the length of a string. The said tail will compare in length with the usual run of cows tails. For further and fuller description of said cow I will refer to the committee of the common council on private property.

GENERAL EASTERN NEWS.

 The Resilient Flood.
 OMAHA, April 18.—The Missouri river is again rising. It has risen at this point about two feet and a half since yesterday morning and is beginning again to overflow bottom lands in this vicinity, caused by warm weather melting the snow in northern Nebraska and Iowa. Logan valley in northern Nebraska is inundated by a sudden rise of Logan river. This region is a rich farming country and some considerable damage may be done. Several railroad washouts have occurred and telegraphic communication has been cut off. Steps are being taken in Omaha to send relief to sufferers from floods in northern Nebraska and Dakota. The finance committee to-day raised nearly \$3,000 cash, of which amount Samuel J. Tilden contributed \$250 by telegram. The committee expect to double the amount already raised. Clothing has already been collected and forwarded and more will follow.
