A paper mill which is nearing completion at Clarksville, Missouri, will be the only establishment of the kind in that state.

Ireland received over 16,000,000 bushels of Indian corn from the United States last year, or more than any other country in Europe.

The loss to the principal western railroad companies by the recent snow blockades will exceed the net earnings for January and February.

Extensive floods are again reported in the Missouri river. Iowa, Illinois, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Nebraska and Dakota also suffer more or less from floods.

The nail makers are hopeful under the prospect of a brisk and permanent business, which commences unusually early this season, and are advancing their prices.

The south has more than doubled the amount of its cotton manufacturing capital in the ten years just closed. The north did not quite add eighteen per cent to her capital. The south nearly doubled her product of cotton goods.

One of the most interesting objects offered to public inspection at the Sydney International exhibition was a dwelling house exclusively made of paper, and furnished throughout with articles manufactured from the same material.

Republican senators, particularly those from the west, who have all along opposed an extra session of congress, assert that none will be called, certainly not sooner than October, and not then unless something arises to make it necessary.

Ogden Mormon leaders are trying to establish a church organ there by compelling the saints to sign a contract agreeing to give a certain portion of their income toward its support. The scheme don't go down as smoothly as castor oil.

The Oregonian yesterday gives the public levee decision of the Supreme court. The city of Portland is sustained by the affirmation of the opinion that public grounds cannot be appropriated by a railway corporation without consent of the local authorities.

Duncan McIntyre of the Pacific syndicate, London, reports that the directors of the Canadian Pacific railway company have completed in England arrangements for vigorous prosecution of that enterprise. The bonds of the company will not be negotiated until the railway is finished.

At the depth of 70 feet, 14 feet of sand carbonates were struck in the New York mine, situated about three quarters of a mile from Pitkin, Colorado. The ore assays 107 ounces of silver per ton. The strike caused great excitement. Miners were out by night with lanterns stalking off claims.

Four Baltimore delegations visited the president on Wednesday in regard to the city postmaster-ship. The president said that he would appoint a man acceptable to the great business interests of the city, not to suit any faction. Unless such a man was proposed with greater unanimity than was now apparent he might go outside the city, or even appoint a democrat.

The friends of Attorney General MacVeagh say that if William E. Chandler is confirmed as solicitor general, the former will decline to assign him any court business, as he has authority to do, and will confine Chandler to office work. It is evident that MacVeagh has determined to prevent Chandler from becoming solicitor general. MacVeagh is a kicker, but this is not considered reliable.

Prof. Hains, of Chicago, is putting another faster into practice, a man named Grisco, who is himself both a chemist and physiologist. It is expected that the forthcoming experiment will furnish what the Tanner and Duell affairs did not, namely, many valuable data as to the chemistry and physiology, general and microscopic, of protracted starvation. Grisco is rather under the middle age, of tolerably compact physique, and the wildest of enthusiasts.

Artesian Wells. Oregonian, 21st. The company who took the contract for sinking an artesian well on the Ainsworth block, have met with much difficulty thus far. After sinking the well about twelve or fifteen feet a large boulder was struck which could not be penetrated. This impediment caused a temporary suspension of operations. A well was then dug a few feet distant and a small tunnel run down toward the bottom of the artesian well. This was done for the purpose of removing the boulder. But as soon as the well reached the gravel bed the water began to pour in with such rapidity that the men were forced to suspend operations. This water comes from seepage from the river, and to attempt to pump out the well would be folly. So the project has been abandoned of attempting to sink an artesian well at that place. The company will commence next to sink a well at the new residence of Geo. W. Weidler, on Nineteenth and H streets. In speaking of artesian wells, the Telegram of last evening says: "In the year 1855 Mr. Arrigoni contracted with San Francisco parties to sink a well of this kind on the corner of Eighth and Taylor streets. The apparatus, tools, etc., arrived and the work inaugurated. After sinking to the depth of one hundred and fifty feet large boulders were struck, which resisted all efforts to remove them and broke every drill, auger and tool that the company had or could get made. After continued efforts in vain the work was abandoned, and the parties returned to San Francisco. A few years after that a purse of \$1700 was subscribed, to be increased to \$2700, to any person who would sink an artesian well and obtain overflowing water anywhere within a radius of five miles from the city. Companies in San Francisco were communicated with on the subject, but all refused to make the attempt."
