OFFICIAL. Proceedings of the Board of Pilot Commissioners.

At a regular session of the board of pilot commissioners for the Columbia and Willamet rivers, held at their office May 12th, the following members were present: Capt. J. A. Brown, chairman; Capt. J. G. Hustler and Capt. J. H. D. Gray, commissioners, and S. T. McKean, secretary.

Applications for a renewal of branch as bar pilot were received from A. D. Wass and Geo. C. Flavel. Application for a branch to pilot on the Columbia river bar was received from Geo. W. Woods.

Applications for branches to pilot on the Columbia and Willamet rivers were received from W. A. Betts and F. C. Congdon.

Application for branch as harbor pilot at city of Portland was received from Jas. T. Gray.

The following resolutions were offered by Commissioner Gray and on motion adopted by unanimous vote: Resolved, That no bar or river pilot shall be allowed to absent himself from his pilot ground for a longer period than five days without first obtaining permission of a majority of this board.

Resolved, That all bar pilots shall state in their application, or file with the secretary of the board, the name and tonnage of the steam tug or sail pilot boat to which they belong, and the failure of any pilot to comply with the provisions of these resolutions shall be deemed a sufficient cause for the suspension or revocation of the said pilot license.

At a meeting of the board, held on the afternoon of the 12th, the following resolutions were adopted: For the Columbia river bar, to Capt. A. D. Wass, Geo. C. Flavel, and Geo. W. Woods.

To W. H. Smith, Wm. A. Betts and F. C. Congdon for the Columbia and Willamet rivers. The rate of pilotage for the Columbia and Willamet rivers were established as follows:

Eleven hundred tons of salt and tin plate were landed at Astoria from the Clan Grant. She left for Portland yesterday. Her outward cargo will consist of salmon and flour for Liverpool.

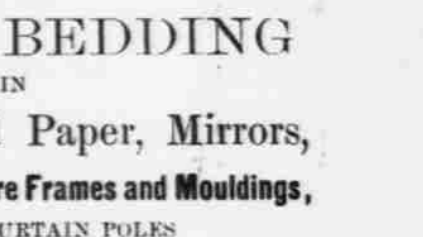
