Pacific county, Washington territory, Commissioners court proceedings, May 24, 3d, 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th, 1881.
Present—Sebastian Giesey, L. H. Rhodes and W. D. Wheatdon, commissioners, and John Davis, clerk.
Ordered, that the proceedings of February, 1881, session being read, be annulled as follows by striking out the following order, to wit: Ordered, that the settlement of J. L. Stout, supervisor of road district No. 1, be approved, and that thereupon the proceedings stand approved.
Ordered, that the boundary of school district No. 22 be so changed as to include the following portion of T 10 N, R 11 W, in said district, to wit: Beginning at the NE corner of T 10 N, R 11 W; thence W $\frac{1}{2}$ mile, thence S to the SW corner of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec. 12; thence E to the E boundary of T 10 N, R 11 W; thence N to place of beginning.
Ordered, that the settlement of J. L. Stout, supervisor of road district No. 1 for the year 1880, as corrected, be approved, and that orders be drawn on the funds of said district for the amount due.
Ordered, that the bonds of D. A. Rodway and I. S. Jones to procure liquor licenses be approved.
Ordered, that the auditor be instructed to copy into a book to be kept in his office, all bonds and oaths of county officers.
Ordered, that the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec. 9, T 9 N, R 10 W, be leased to H. S. Gile and E. J. Ford for the term of six years, at the rate of ten dollars (\$10) per annum, payable yearly in advance.
Ordered, that A. S. Bush be appointed supervisor of Bay Center road district No. 1, for the ensuing year.
Ordered, that John B. Rose be appointed supervisor of North River road district No. 7, for the ensuing year.
Ordered, that a new road district be formed out of portions of South Bend district No. 6 and North River district No. 7, said new district to be called and known as Smith Creek road district No. 2, bounded and described as follows, viz: Beginning at the SE corner sec 20, T 14 N, R 8 W; thence N to the county line; thence W $\frac{1}{2}$ miles; thence S to the Willapa river; thence E following the meanders of said river to the NE corner of lot 3, sec 26, T 14 N, R 9 W; thence E to place of beginning.
Ordered, that the petition of Thos. Roney and others praying for the establishment of a county road from Wheatons mill to the residence of F. Albright, T. Roney & Co., on Mill creek, in the Willapa valley, be granted, and W. W. Lilley, James Swain and J. H. Turner appointed viewers, and J. A. Wheatdon, surveyor, to meet at said mill on the 27th day of May, 1881, and view, survey, and lay out said proposed road.
Ordered, that the petition of A. K. Bush and others, praying for a road from the north bank of the Willapa river beginning at or near the east line of A. K. Bush land claim, running thence in a northerly direction to Smith creek be granted; and Orlan S. Lammage, James Swain and John Skidmore are hereby appointed viewers, and J. A. Wheatdon surveyor; to meet at the residence of A. K. Bush on the 25th day of May, 1881, to view, survey and lay out said road.
Ordered, That the boundaries of Taret road district No. 9, be changed and said district be bounded as follows, viz: Beginning at the NW corner of lot 2, sec. 32, T 12 N, R 11 W, thence east to Shoalwater bay, thence following the meanders of Shoalwater bay to the NE corner of lot 1, Sec. 6, T 10 N, R 10 W, thence following former boundary of said district to the NW corner of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec. 27, T 10 N, R 11 W, thence E to the NE corner of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec. 27, T 10 N, R 11 W, thence S following the county line to the point of the peninsula, thence south following the meanders of Bakers bay to the military reservation, thence W to the Pacific ocean, thence following the country line to place of beginning.
Ordered, that Peninsula road district No. 1, be bounded as follows, viz: Beginning at the NW corner of lot 2, Sec. 33, T 12 N, R 11 W, thence S following the county line to the point of the peninsula, thence south following the meanders of Shoalwater bay to the SE corner of lot 4, Sec. 10, T 12 N, R 11 W, thence W to the NE corner of the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 9, T 12 N, R 11 W, thence S to the NW corner of the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 33, T 12 N, R 11 W, thence W to place of beginning.
Ordered, that Wallcut road district be bounded as follows, viz: Beginning at the NW corner of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ section 27, T 10 N, R 11 W; thence E to the NE corner of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec 27, T 10 N, R 11 W; thence E to the NE corner of lot 3, sec 34, T 10 N, R 11 W; thence E, N and S, following former boundary of said district to place of beginning.
Ordered, that the bonds of petitioners for a county road at Wheatons mill, and from Willapa river to Smith creek be approved.
Ordered, that the settlement of I. S. Jones, treasurer of Pacific county, be approved.
Ordered, that the settlement of John Brown, sheriff of Pacific county, be approved.
Ordered, that the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec 15, and W $\frac{1}{4}$ of NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec 22, T 10 N, R 11 W, heretofore assessed to J. L. Phillips and sold to Pacific county for taxes, be forfeited, and the sheriff is hereby ordered to publish notice and make sale of said real estate, on or before the 27th day of June, 1881.
In the matter of the remonstrance of certain householders of Pacific county, remonstrating against a petition for a road commencing at the east line of A. K. Bush land claim, running east to the first creek, thence north to Smith creek or the county line, is ordered rejected, there being no such petition presented to this board.
Ordered, that J. L. Stout return to the auditor of Pacific county the tax list and warrant issued to the supervisor of Peninsula road district No. 1, for the year 1881, and thereupon the auditor is instructed to furnish the supervisor of Taret road district No. 9 with an additional list of the assessable property annexed to and by the change of the boundary of said district No. 9; and it is ordered that said Taret district pay all indebtedness of said Peninsula district prior to the division, made May 5, 1881.
Ordered, that Osborne Goulter be appointed supervisor of Peninsula road district No. 1 for the ensuing year.
In the matter of the petitions for the division of South Bend school district No. 11, it is ordered that the petition be not granted, for the reason that a remonstrance has been presented to this board, with good and sufficient reasons for not granting the same.
Ordered, that the petition for the consolidation of school districts Nos. 4 and 6 be not granted, good and sufficient reasons for the same having been furnished to this board.
Ordered, that J. H. Turner be appointed supervisor of Smith creek road district No. 2, for the ensuing year.
Ordered, that there not appearing to the board of commissioners of Pacific county any just ground for the demands made by Wahkiakima county against the school funds of Pacific county the same be and is hereby rejected.
Ordered, that the clerk of this board notify all persons in areas with interest on school money, to settle the same on or before July 1, 1881.
Ordered, that the grand and petit jurors required of Pacific county for 1881 be furnished as per list on file with the auditor.
Ordered, that the following bills be allowed, viz:
