The senate adjourned sine die on the 20th. No president pro tem was elected.

The Pennsylvania nominations were divided between the Cameron anti-Cameron wings of the republican party.

Busy times are expected at Albany next week. At least that is what the telegrams say. The anti-Conkling men are losing ground.

Conkling appears to be on top—his party is strongly composed of readjusters and stickers. That's what we want in this country. Adjust things and then stick to them.

Mr. Villard says that every obligation imposed upon the Northern Pacific Railroad company by act of congress will be strictly recognized. "There is nothing fairer than that."

The president sent for LeDuc Friday morning to come to the White-house. LeDuc put in an appearance, and the president told him that he must leave his resignation immediately. It was written then and there.

The Sacramento Bee announces that the late California legislature restored the bounty on wolves. We have no doubt of it. That legislature would restore hair on the baldhead if the roots were not winter killed. That legislature was a perfect cure.

The English are making great exertions to infuse a liberal British element into southern Africa. Seductive placards have been posted up all over London offering great inducements to settlers who will adopt agriculture as a pursuit. The trouble with the Cape colony is that two-thirds of the people are dutch, and that more than half the 2607 English emigrants who arrived there last year are adventurers or artisans.

The members of the monetary conference are having an excellent time in Paris. Dinners and entertainments are given in their honor with great regularity, and our American delegates are likely to return better judges of wine and French cooking than of the different standards. No doubt Everts shines at these festive occasions, as he is a master of agreeable conversation, and a happy after-dinner speaker. It would be interesting to know what impression Thurman's red bandanna makes on the assembled delegates at one of these fashionable spreads; and whether his elaborate method of taking snuff is properly appreciated.

The Philadelphia New North-west says that at a meeting of the board of directors of the Northern Pacific railroad company, on the 29th of March, Mr. French, the government railway commissioner, now in Oregon, addressed the directors. The substance of his speech was that he had come from Washington to officially state the policy and purpose of the government in the event of the Oregon Railway and Navigation company acquiring the ownership and control of the Northern Pacific railroad, and changing its route as prescribed by the company's charter or stopping its completion. He said that the government would require the construction of the road over the Cascade mountains to Tacoma; and if the Northern Pacific company, under whatever management, refused to build there, the attorney general of the United States would commence a legal proceeding to compel compliance with the company's charter, and subsequent acts of congress. And he impressively gave notice, that any arrangement or compromise by which the obligation to build to Puget-sound from lake Superior was avoided or suspended, would be treated by the government as a violation of the company's charter, and null and void.

The clerks and sheriffs in the different counties in this state, to which the new salary law applied did not relish the idea of losing the fees which have ruled so long, so they "pooled their issues" and carried the matter into the Supreme-court. Yesterday the Oregonian furnishes the decision that the law is unconstitutional and void, consequently we will have to return to the old law and be compelled to pay out to clerks alone during every term of office something like \$50,000 to \$75,000 in the state more than their services are actually worth.

Concerning the new pilot bill proposed by the Multnomah delegation, we wish to call special attention to section eighteen. That clause was to drive coasters to the wall, and there is no coaster in the trade but has a commander fully as competent as any pilot on this bar. THE ASTORIAN made this fight for the coasters: "Let them come in free, at least at the option of the masters themselves." But no; you must take a pilot though he be your inferior, but you need not take a tug, the very thing they always want.
