Common council met this evening.
 —Capt. Flavel's dock is getting well filled with salmon for export.
 —The Selkirkshire was towed to sea by the Astoria, Malcolm pilot.
 —The steamer Columbia crossed the bar seawards yesterday forenoon.
 —The pupils of Grace (Episcopal) church school expect to enjoy a picnic on Friday next.
 —The Portland firemen have got horses for No. 1, and a row on hand about the American Exchange fire.
 —The steamer California will sail for Puget-sound and Alaska ports Tuesday, May 31st, at 3 A. M.
 —Capt. Noyes has taken excellent care of the Besse and the large number on board, fumigating almost daily.
 —The Mary Blinell arrived down yesterday in tow of the Ordway, Gilman pilot. She is loaded and ready for sea.
 —It is said that Astoria has at least something in a commercial way which Portland does not care if we keep—the small-pox in quarantine.
 —Trout fishing is so good in the vicinity of Astoria now that there is no occasion whatever to lie about it. It is certainly most extraordinary.
 —The new government steamer Robert T. Lincoln is now here, and has been daily inspected and turned over to Lieut. Price, in charge of the bar survey.
 —Mr. Martin Dillon claims that his team horses were foully placed in quarantine by the pound master yesterday. We hope the matter will be investigated.
 —It is claimed that the first water on the fire Saturday was from Capt. Flavel's pump. Capt. J. G. Huester acted as foreman, with Mr. C. S. Wright assistant.
 —Mr. Wm. T. Everson, for a long time engineer at Willamets No. 1, in Portland, takes the position of engineer on the new government tug, Robert T. Lincoln.
 —In consequence of the accident to the State of California, the Oregon did not sail from San Francisco for this port and Portland until yesterday, the Oregonian informs us.
 —Complaints reach the office of the Mayor daily regarding the roadway, which is dangerous, in very many places, from the city hall to the eastern limit of the town line.
 —The fire on the farm of Judge Callender last Friday makes the second time his buildings have been thus destroyed. He will rebuild immediately. This fire will perhaps delay his journey to the springs.
 —If the roadway is not repaired a serious accident is very liable to be reported; and if property holders have been duly notified, and if they have property enough in sight, it may be confiscated to pay damages.
 —Tillamook county is connected with Clatsop county by a resolution of the legislative assembly and a one horse trail. It is also connected with Yamhill county by judiciary law and a wagon road, which is being improved by contributions from Portland. We are thus to be left in the cold, it seems.
 —Capt. P. Johnson, who was piloting the Clan Grant to Portland at the time she grounded, informs us that he was running close alongside of deep water, when the ship took a sheer and stuck. The vessel has finally reached Portland but the expense was heavy. A full examination of the matter will be made.
 —Judge Callender met with a serious loss of buildings on his Clatsop farm last Friday, the residence, milk house, tool house, wood house, etc., were all swept away by fire. The loss is about \$1,200 to \$1,500 with no insurance. The fire is supposed to have originated from a stove pipe put through the kitchen roof. His tenant, Mr. Ellis, had barely time to save some of his furniture.

Small Pox.
 The Alden Besse, from Hongkong, arrived on Sunday, but was unable to pass quarantine in consequence of small-pox on board. The state health officer took steps at once to relieve the sick and distressed, and has established a quarantine station on the hill just outside the city, and is endeavoring to establish one on the bay side of the peninsula where the sick and convalescent may be cared for. All the white persons on board, and part of the Chinese have been vaccinated, except those that have been sick. Every precaution has been taken to prevent the spread of the disease, which has been confined to but few on board, by the excellent management and discipline enforced by Capt. Noyes on the passage, and for the last thirty days, since when the disease made its first appearance. As this is wholly the duty of the state health officer, as provided by legislative enactment, the city officials have no authority to take advance steps, but the mayor and committee on health and police heartily co-operate with the state health officer, Dr. Tuttle, in every way possible to prevent the disease from becoming epidemic. There are five Chinese, all convalescent, and three white men who have had the venereal, very light, and are now recovering. There is one man only, Mr. Hardy, second officer, sick with small pox. Just as soon as the sick can be moved to quarantine station the ship will be thoroughly fumigated. Mr. Hardy is isolated on ship board, and his attendant fumigates and disinfects every time he visits him. The following card is issued by Dr. Tuttle:

Quarantine.
 All persons are hereby notified that the American bark Alden Besse has been quarantined at the quarantine grounds, below Smith's point, and no one is permitted to visit or board said vessel without the permission of the health officer. Take notice also that a quarantine station has been established at the last house on the Smith's point road, on the top of the hill, to the southwest of the city; this quarantine station is for the accommodation of those officers and white passengers of the Alden Besse who have not as yet shown any signs of infection, and who, it is hoped, will be better secured against it. All persons are strictly forbidden and prohibited from visiting or approaching nearer to said grounds than fifty yards to the windward side, except by special permit granted and signed by the health officer. Any one desiring to communicate with those occupying the station, can do so by application to me in person. A red flag will be displayed at the station.

 —The Argonaut secured a copy of the Oregonian at Cathlamet yesterday and made a bee-line for THE ASTORIAN office with it, getting in about two hours ahead of the Emma Hayward. That's enterprise which we admire. Thank you, Vin.
 —Mr. George Lohman, a fisherman on the river, but from whom canny we are not informed, caught a threshold whale in his net yesterday morning and succeeded in capturing it and taking it ashore. The head produced four hundred gallons of oil.
 —A member of the Sacramento legislature who had introduced eleven bills and didn't get one of them passed, was going home on the cars with a party of friends, when the newsboy of the train threw a book in his lap. The legislator took it up and read the title, A Fool's Errand, and turning to a companion asked, "How the dace did that boy know I was a member of the legislature? He hit me the first time."
 —New Jersey is the gem of the ocean. Not only is the state out of debt, but it owns bonds, and draws revenue from one thing and another to such an amount that no state tax is required. The last legislature, feeling that the state treasury was in danger of being swamped by the large amount of money constantly coming in, and nobody to keep it back with a broom, has offered \$5,000 to every town and city that will raise as much more, for instruction in industrial, mechanical and agricultural pursuits. With this munificent offer to agricultural societies, it would seem as though there hadn't ought to be a boy in the state, in five years, who would not know which horse to bet his money on at a fair.

There is no need of a panic, or cramps, over this thing.
 —The third railway across the continent, the Oregon Railway and Navigation via Boise city and Granger, will be completed in two years. The fourth line, the Atlantic and Pacific, is pushing steadily westward, and will reach the Pacific in four or five years. Operations on the fifth trans-continental line, the Northern Pacific railroad, will have connection with the coast within three years, while the sixth, the great Canadian Pacific enterprise, is under contract for completion within ten years. Capital will probably take a long pause before attempting to add others to this list of gigantic enterprises spanning the continent.
