Commodore Nutt, Liliputian, died of Bright's disease, in Jersey city, on Wednesday.

Mr. Villard has purchased the New York Evening Post. Carl Schurz will be editor in chief.

It looks now to be almost certain that Conkling will be returned to the United States senate, and Mr. Blaine will retire from the cabinet.

For the week ending May 21st, in Havana, there occurred three deaths from yellow fever, twenty-four from smallpox and thirteen from typhoid fever.

The first broad gauge railroad train reached Walla-walla Wednesday evening. Track laying on the Dayton branch commenced yesterday. The track will be standard gauge and of steel rails.

The St. Paul Press, which has all along opposed Mr. Villard, now comments favorably. It says: "The people of the northwest will meet him in his new attitude towards it with a sincere and friendly hope that he will prove worthy of the great trust he has assumed."

Gen. J. A. Williamson, commissioner of the general land office, tendered the secretary of the interior his resignation on Wednesday. He will take the position of general land commissioner for the Atlantic and Pacific railway on the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe branch.

Several influential gentlemen on Wednesday visited the White house and made a protest against Blaine's going to New York with the apparent design of entering the senatorial fight. Garfield expressed surprise to learn that Blaine was absent. Blaine immediately returned to Washington.

An excursion steamer collapsed through carelessness near London, Ontario, on the 25th, and two hundred lives were lost. The cause was from overloading the steamer. The load is variously estimated at between four hundred and six hundred. Such things would never be allowed to occur in American waters.

Events immediately attending the closing hours of congress have made a breach in the cabinet which cannot be held except by the retirement of Blaine or McVeagh. This fact is apparent from droppings from McVeagh's tongue on political matters when he arrived in Philadelphia to attend the funeral of Thos. A. Scott, on Wednesday.

The new liquor law went into effect in Kansas on May 1st, and the reports from different sections of the state indicate a more general observance of it than was expected by the most sanguine advocates of the measure. In the smaller towns the saloons have practically all been closed, an exception here and there being reported.

The Arkansas democracy, like that of Tennessee, is going to pieces on the question of state finances. The democrats of the southern states, having begun repudiation with entire unanimity, are quarreling as to when and how to stop it. In Virginia the two factions of repudiators are attacking each other with a fierceness exceeding that which, when united, they exhibited towards a common foe. In its desperation one faction comes out squarely for the doctrine of equal rights to all, without distinction of race or color. In Tennessee the quarrel was so managed that the republicans elected their governor, and the states creditors have made a better arrangement than the most sanguine among them ever dared to hope for. They have received a low interest bond, with the coupons receivable for taxes. In Arkansas troubles are increasing, and threaten to culminate in a grand fight over repudiation.

The Personal Political Style

Dallas Register, May 26th. We notice that Bill Watkins is still pouring out his slops on Col. Nesmith through the columns of the Sunday Mercury. He has had the records of the courts in Maine examined, and wrote to the clerk of the court in this county to see if there was not some defect in the Colonel's title to his land, but all to no purpose. William bites a file, and had better learn to spell and return to Washington and draw his six dollars per day as clerk of the committee on manufactures. That would be following up the methods he learned under Grover. If Williams character should ever become a subject worthy of investigation, it will not be necessary to send to Maine, as the records of the courts in Marion and Multnomah show that he has been three times indicted and once convicted of felony, and is now under arrest for a penitentiary offense. The wretch who has robbed the state and plundered his private creditors will have ample occupation in taking care of his own character. Col. Nesmith does well to spurn his fellow and treat his slanderers with contempt.

The Southern Pacific is to build immediately a line of railroad from Yuma to Point Ysabel, at the head of the gulf of California, where wharves and warehouses and other shipping facilities will be established. A line of fast steamers will be placed on the gulf to run to Guaymas, Mazatlan and other Mexican ports, all to be in complete running order by the first of October.

Not Chicago alone, but New York also is exceedingly jealous of the rapidly growing favor of the Mississippi grain route to Europe. A strong pressure is being brought to bear on the New York legislature to abolish the canal tolls as the only hope of saving the grain trade to the east. This can only be done by a constitutional amendment. If it should be adopted by the people the tax-payers of the state will be obliged to pay a large sum every year for the benefit of the grain dealers of the city of New York.
