—Joseph Humes boat No. 2,

—Astoria Engine company No. 1,

—Hen. D. P. Thompson has pur-
 chased the Starr block on Front street
 Portland, corner of Oak, so long in
 dispute, paying \$50,000 for it. Mr.
 C. H. Lewis is about to build a \$20,-
 000 dock at the lower end of the city.

—Levi Leland, Grand Lecturer of
 L.O.G.T. of Oregon and California, will
 lecture on temperance this evening
 (27th) at the Young Men's Christian
 association rooms in this city; and at
 upper Astoria Saturday evening, as
 per posters. Seats will be free, and
 all are invited to come.

—A large amount of freight for
 Astoria was again carried by the city
 yesterday in the great haste of the
 steamer Oregon to reach Portland.
 This thing is getting to be monotonous
 —it is considered a nuisance; and the
 attention of the company managers
 has been emphatically called to the
 matter.

—Dr. Tuttle, acting state health
 officer, informs us that there are no
 new cases developed among the crew
 or passengers of the Besse, and all the
 sick are improving finely. The only
 case of smallpox, that of the second
 officer, is getting along splendidly. The
 sick ones have all been placed in
 quarantine station on the opposite side
 of Youngs bay, on the Henry Brallier
 place.

—Owing to the freight blockade on
 the Union Pacific railroad, at the Mis-
 souri river crossing, the Rodgers will
 not sail for the Arctic much before the
 middle of June. Supplies, with other
 freight, have been detained at Council
 bluffs, and cannot reach San Francisco
 to permit the sailing by June 1st.
 Work on the Rodgers has progressed
 rapidly, and Lieut. Berry seems well
 satisfied with the vessel. The govern-
 ment is supplying the crew with all
 the necessaries, and some luxuries, for
 their long voyage. The crew is a fine
 body of men. A few were enlisted in
 San Francisco, but the majority volun-
 teered in New York and other Atlantic
 ports. The regular pay of the navy is
 their only compensation.

 spectfully request that you take im-
 mediate steps to prevent it, as it is a
 serious annoyance to us, and is dan-
 gerous to our business.
