In view of the condition of affairs among the Utes and the possibility that there may be trouble there, the war department has decided that telegraphic communication with the interior of the Ute territory shall be established.

It is a notorious fact says a Dublin telegram, that all recent disturbances have been raised in agricultural districts where the farmers are well off. To speak of these people as objects of compassion, as downtrodden, rack-rented victims of landlord cruelty, is untrue.

Should Peru, as proposed, be annexed to Chili, the result would be the most remarkably shaped nation on the face of the globe—something after the style of an early spring radish. Its extreme length would be 2,340 miles, and its average breadth for over two-thirds of this distance not more than 120 miles—little else than a strip of sea coast walled in upon the east by continuous mountain ranges.

Secretary Blaine and Sir Edward Thornton concluded negotiations in regard to the outrages upon American seamen at Fortuna bay. American claims for losses by several fishermen aggregated \$130,000. The agreement between Blaine and Thornton is that the British shall pay \$60,000 less than the amount claimed, in gold coin, and this government will give a receipt in full. The money will probably be paid some time this week, and be distributed among the losers, principally Gloucester fishermen.

The manifesto issued by the czar has been answered by the Russian revolutionists, usually termed nihilists, which document, as reported, indicates good sense on the part of those who drew it up and spread it before the country, as well as his majesty. As reported, it seems indited by men who wish well to their country, to the ruler as well as to his people. It is the second utterance of the committee, or whatever they may be called; they having, in a previous reply to the czar's proclamation, told him that they accept his announcement as war upon them, and meet it as such. But in this latter reply, as reported, there is expression of a different character. They do not talk of war or assassination. They utter complaints against the policy of his government in certain respects, condemn various acts of the government, dwell upon the wretchedness of the peasants, condemn the deportation of the people of Siberia, the gagging of free speech and public journals, and declaring that false counsellors are in possession of the czar's ear. These are strong points, and who shall say they are not true, except, perhaps, the czar? The advice they give the czar in concluding their manifesto consists of some sentences which seem written with a kindly and patriotic spirit. Whether what they suggest and assert can be taken as fact, may be doubtful. But if they speak truly, it would seem that the true and sensible course of the government ought to be in the direction of the line pointed out by them. It is respectful towards the czar and patriotic in expression. "Let your majesty assemble your people around you and listen to their wishes in an unprejudiced spirit, and then, neither your majesty nor the state will have any reason to apprehend further catastrophe." This is reasonable, sensible advice, and unless the czar has made up his mind to persist in the unwise course which his father, the late czar, adopted and pursued during the latter years of his reign, he may see the wisdom of the advice given him by this terrible secret committee of men, fully resolved to enforce a change of policy by whatever means may be necessary to effect it. Their manifesto is the first sensible utterance from that source, if it be nihilists who have issued it, of which there may be doubts.
