The Kasankine Road.

Supervisor W. H. Gray adds a postscript to a letter on business, as follows: "Our road work has progressed to the Grange cemetery, so that a team can be driven to that place. If we could have a little assistance we could open a road to the Walluska, by straightening it and going upon shorter and better ground, which I have carefully gone over twice within a few days. The present trail is an insult to common sense and next to impassable for man or beast. Besides, it will require more labor to make it passable in the present location—where it is claimed to be approved by the County-court—than there is in this district. I found a good, dry and easy grade from the Grange cemetery, on good ground and a much shorter distance, which can be made a better trail than the present one in much less time and less labor than it will take to make the present one passable, which is more than we can do this year, and when it is all expended it is not a good and easy grade as there is within two hundred yards of the present opening. I also learn by examining marks, said to be made by the surveyor and viewers, that the present trail but seldom touches the first survey made by order of the County-court. My proposition is to go on with present volunteer work and funds and open a road where there is no personal objection on the part of the owners of the land. When it is opened a team of oxen can pass through to the Walluska. Then let us ask the County-court for a survey as per the eleventh section of the road law of 1880, which appears to me to meet our case exactly; and if the citizens of Astoria will trust me with expending two hundred and fifty dollars of their money on the road I propose to open, within another year and if alive, I will ride from the Kasankine farm to Astoria in a two-horse carriage, or an ox wagon with a load of supplies for a Fourth of July dinner, 1882. Suggesting my friend Nurnburgh keep open his part of the road a scow or bridge can cross us on the Walluska. I include the legitimate road work of this district as at present assessed in this proposition. You can help us in this undertaking as well as to help the town. W. H. GRAY.

The Mystery Explained.
