Mr. Villard's Letter. If there were the slightest excuse for complaints from people of eastern Oregon and Washington, with respect to the course pursued by the Oregon Railway and Navigation company, Mr. Villard's letter, which we reproduce to-day, ought to satisfy all as to the fact that unbiased opinion will award fairness and justice to him and the companies which he represents. We ask special attention to his remarks in reference to storage, commission, interest, etc. There has been great stress laid upon charges brought to bear against the company, and by tracing the matter to its source it may be discovered that the ones who have been the most exacting in this case, are the ones who have feasted most from unjust filings. The same words will apply to the gang who are constantly harping about inefficient tug boats, and immoderate charges for pilotage, towage, etc., at the mouth of the Columbia.

There are now fifteen Mormon settlements in northern Arizona, with an aggregate population of at least seven thousand, and they are growing rapidly.

Governor Foster says, by way of excuse, that the President forgot his promise to Platt to consult him before naming the collector. Forgive it good—the Alta remarks.

Speaker Sharp declares that the story of the Arthur-Conkling quarrel is absurd. Nobody possesses the confidence and affection of Conkling more than does Arthur. Everybody interested denies the half-breed lie.

Boston has got along so far with its world's fair project as to have a soap of it printed in the Herald. It looks very well. All that is needed now to boost the enterprise through is a guarantee fund of three million dollars.

It is said of a girl out in Indiana that last year she cultivated, harvested, threshed and sold 350 bushels of wheat. And now, instead of going to Washington to press her claims for a postoffice, she has bought a new sulky-plow, and entered on another campaign.

One of the witnesses in the Whittaker case, a colored clergyman from South Carolina, whose examination lasted about twenty minutes; received in return a check for \$275, and went home as happy as a bonanza king. He is in favor of giving Whittaker as many new trials as he wants.

The directors of the American agricultural association are in favor of holding a National fair in New York next fall, and President Garfield, for one, has expressed a willingness to contribute to its success. But why cripple the enterprise as the start by locating it in New York?

Secretary Hunt on Friday forwarded instructions to Commissioner Cooper, United States steamer Alliance, new at Norfolk, Virginia, to prepare his ship, with all possible dispatch, to proceed on a cruise in search of the Jeannette, between Greenland, Iceland and the coast of Norway, and as far as the northern coast of Spitzbergen.

Philadelphia and New York papers say that the new situation of affairs of the Northern Pacific company, as brought about by the success of Mr. Villard, are favorably regarded by the public, and that it is generally conceded that the prospects of the company have been improved by the changes effected in controlling interests. These conclusions are borne out fully by the marked advance in the stocks of the company.

The measure for land reform in Russia now lacks only the Czar's signature to go into immediate effect. Practically it would place the Russian small farmer in a better position than the Irish peasant. It is what Melikoff and the liberals have labored to secure for the last year, but the chances are now decidedly against it. The new Czar has shown that he is inclined toward the old methods, and is ruled by the ultra-conservatives who do not believe in reform.

Flashes from the Wires. BY MAIL AND TELEGRAPH. Successors to Conkling and Platt have not yet been chosen. The Grand lodge of Masons convened in Olympia yesterday. An interesting session is expected.

A terrific storm visited parts of Texas last Saturday destroying much property, damaging crops, and causing loss of life.

James Gamble has tendered his resignation as general superintendent of the Pacific division of the Western Union Telegraph company, to take effect June 10th.

It is expected that the Olympia and Tenino railroad will change hands very soon. It has been purchased by capitalists who will extend it to tide water; probably to Bakers bay.

Notwithstanding all doubts and contradictions to the contrary, the Oregonian (limited) narrow gauge railway have passed into the hands of Mr. Villard. This comes officially by cable, from Scotland.

Under orders from the war department Gen. Pope is stationing troops at accessible points for service in case there should be trouble with the Ute Indians, when their removal under the Ute treaty is to be consummated.

John Bull has invested \$60,000,000 in American railroads since the first of last December.

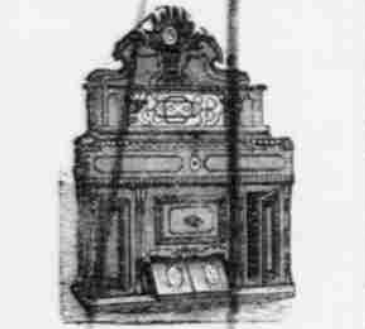
