The egg gatherers on the Farallones having become an unmagnified nuisance the government ordered their removal. This was accomplished without trouble. Marshal Pope and a squad of soldiers visiting the islands for that purpose in the steamer Manzanita which vessel took the men, numbering eleven, and all their effects to San Francisco.

The Coos bay News states that immigrants in large numbers are coming to Coos county from Finland. The latter country is now under the dominion of Russia, and the government requires involuntary service from the Finns. To escape this new oppression the inhabitants are deserting their former homes and seeking refuge in Oregon and other free lands.

The annual report comes from Lewis county of the recent discovery of a rich gold ledge in the Cascade mountains, somewhere near the head of the Coquille river. It is said to yield the enormous amount of \$6,000 per ton. It is known that parties have been prospecting in the mountains but we are astonished at the amount the rock is said to yield. The fact remains to be developed.

The twenty-seventh annual convocation of the Missionary jurisdiction of the Protestant Episcopal church in Oregon held its first service in Trinity church in Portland, on Thursday evening. There were present the bishops of Oregon and of Washington territory, and the Rev. Messrs. Anderson, Daly, Habersham, McEwan, Perkins, Plummer, Rosenberg, John W. and J. R. W. Seelwood, Smith and Stevens. The bishop of Oregon read his annual address which was full of interest. The work as a whole is encouraging, although nothing of special interest has occurred throughout the year. Two clergymen have been added to the list, but still some parishes are vacant and many portions of the state are untouched. More clergymen are greatly needed.

They were deserting sailors from the British ship Lady Head.
