Clinton & Gill, with their pile driver, will attempt to raise the submerged steamer John Norton to-day.

An advance from \$5 to \$10 per month in wages has recently been made at different mill ports on Puget-sound.

Capt. W. P. Gray will have charge of the new transfer boat at Astoria, which will run her trial trip next Saturday.

Messrs. Hudson and Laidlaw, of Fisherton, were in the city yesterday. A few pressed cans have been made at Fisherton for experiment.

Dr. C. B. Golden, of Marshfield, arrived by the steamer Sol Thomas yesterday, on his way to the Grand-lodge meeting of Masons.

Dr. O'Brien and Mr. Wm. Osters are making a handsome pleasure grounds on the upper side of Wall street, near the head of West-sixth.

The new tug Sol Thomas arrived from Coos bay yesterday to relieve the tug Astoria, which is to be sent to San Francisco for a complete over-hauling. Capt. Hill is in command.

To-day we give the final article upon the subject, "Did Dr. Whitman Save Oregon?" remarking that it will be the last, as we can not devote so much space to such matters in future.

The steamship Geo. W. Elder will sail from San Francisco for Astoria and Portland on Saturday, with freight only, for the purpose of relieving the embargo accumulating at San Francisco.

The British bark Scottish Bard, Little master, 816 tons register, eighty-three days from Rockhampton, arrived yesterday, Mary Taylor towing, Olsen pilot. She is consigned to Laidlaw & Co., Portland.

Capt. F. C. Congdon has retired from the command of the Argonaut, and is succeeded by Capt. Vin Cook. Both are reckoned first-class.

Henry Hendrickson and Bacco Porto were held to answer, and bail fixed at \$500 each, in default of which they were committed to jail until such time as they chose to skip out, for robbery. John Rock, one of the parties implicated, a strapped jour printer who refused to work, got away. It is supposed he left the state.

Coos bay for the principal part of her prosperity is indebted to Simpson Bros. shipbuilding interests, yet no notice that at the very time people generally are hopeful of a reduction in taxes upon our local commerce the assessor of Coos county jumps a vessel ready to leave the ship yard for her home and socks the taxes onto her. The News says: "J. J. Lamb, our energetic assessor, called round in time to assess the Astoria before she got to sea." It looks strange that vessels built there should be thus nipped, when almost every dollar she cost had just been distributed among the people who live there. Will they be taxed also? Making a double assessment.

Death of Mr. O. P. Whitelaw.
Mrs. H. H. Jackson received by last steamer a letter from her brother, Mr. O. P. Whitelaw, which was written on the day of his death, also letters from Mr. W. S. Clendenin, with whom he was stopping at Valle Los Viejas, thirty-three miles from San Diego, when he died. The letter from Mr. Whitelaw seems full of hope and gives a statement of his case from which it appears that he was improving steadily but gained strength slowly in consequence of daily chills. He was anticipating great pleasure in a trip to the Islands with Mrs. McKay, and said: "If I could only get rid of the chills I think I should get along—but a trip on the ocean will help me greatly." Alas, for all human calculations. This was apparently on the morning of the 24th of May, for Mr. Clendenin in his letter says: "He had been out gunning all the afternoon, and came in and dressed his game and appeared as well as usual. He went into the house and sat down, soon after which he commenced to cough, and went out and commenced to bleed, and in about fifteen minutes he died." The remains were conveyed to San Diego, and upon request of Lieut. Jones were temporarily interred in the military cemetery preparatory to final removal east. Mr. T. W. Stackpole, writing from Los Angeles, consoling and sympathizing with Mrs. Jackson in her afflictions, says: "Oscar had our warmest interest in his welfare, and we experienced much pleasure in meeting him and renewing old friendships. While he was here we took a lively interest in doing what we could to make his stay with us a pleasant one." It is a great consolation to Mrs. Jackson, Mrs. McKay, and other friends, to feel that his last moments were probably free from intense suffering. His devotion to his sorrowing sister was to the last so faithful, so noble, that we are quite certain his spirit must rest with the worthy and the just in that better world, the home of the blessed.

A Michigan farmer has just cleaned one of his fields of a lot of stumps that has been an eyesore and annoyance. For the purpose he used dynamite cartridges put up in waterproof oiled muslin, much like a candle in appearance. With a crowbar he bored a hole under the stump, inserted a piece of cartridge about an inch in diameter and from two to four inches long, according to the size of the stump, exploded it by means of a percussion cap inserted in one end, and the stump was blown out, often in fragments.

Another Fisherman Lost.
N. Benson of boat No. 1, and Ludwig Nelson, boat puller, belonging to the West Coast Packing company, were lying at anchor yesterday morning during a strong ebb tide off Chinook with twenty-five fathom of anchor line out and deeming everything safe, laid down to have a little much needed rest. The water was perfectly smooth. Nelson was suddenly aroused by the creaking of the boat and the grating of the side against some hidden object. He had barely time to call to Benson to look out for himself ere the boat capsized. Nelson was picked up by another boat manned by Italians, names not known, but Benson has never been seen since, and is no doubt lost. The boat and net have been recovered, and it was ascertained that the anchor line had parted five fathom out. It is presumed the line was caught by heavy snag drifting. He was a member of Beaver lodge No. 35, I. O. O. F., in good standing.
