Capt. J. G. Hustler and Capt. J. H. D. Gray yesterday made an inspection of the pilot schooner J. C. Cousins, for license as such, by the board of pilot commissioners.

A Fleet of Yachts

Yesterday we took a look at the fine yacht, J. C. Cousins, now employed as a pilot boat on the Columbia river bar. There are certainly few vessels afloat more elegantly rigged, furnished and fitted, and none more substantially built. The Cousins originally cost \$26,000. Her cabins are roomy, handsome and luxurious.

The Fleetwood came down from Portland yesterday in six and one-half hours, for the purpose of going in to dry dock to have a broken propeller replaced. She is a low craft, the main deck being confined to the saloons and galley, the stowage room for freight being below, entered by a forward hatch. The Fleetwood, it is said, will average eighteen miles an hour. She is employed on the Cascade and Dalles route from Portland, in connection with the Gold Dust, as an opposition line.

The schooner Alpha arrived from Portland at three p. m. yesterday, and sailed for Yaquina bay at five o'clock.
The father-in-law of Mr. P. P. Barclay died in San Francisco, June 17th. Mr. R. A. White, for many years a resident of Portland, aged seventy-eight years.

White-lark has got a contract to get the stranded bark David Headley off the rocks in the straits of Foca, where she has now lain several months. He agrees to get her off and repair her at a cost of about \$14,000; and will commence operations on the 1st of July.
Our artist on the "spot," C. H. Stockton is doing some heavy sign writing of late. He has just finished one for Heilborn which nearly covers the broadside of his new store on Chenamus street. The letters are four feet six by three feet six, eighty feet long.

The fine barkentine recently built by Simpson Brothers, at Coos bay, and named Astoria, has been sold to Pope & Talbot for \$35,000. As yet she is not legally named, going down under a builders certificate, and it is the intention of her new owners to name her the Kliekita.
Miss Della Lake and Mr. Monte B. Gwin were married May 4th at the residence of Judge N. M. Hawthorne, in Boise city. The event was celebrated in the midst of a large circle of acquaintances, and the list of presents embraces many elegant articles. Remonstrance from Insurers

The following document will explain itself:
To the Honorable the Committee of the Astoria city council, appointed to consider the petition of the fire insurance company No. 2, Astoria fire department:

We, the undersigned, agents of the respective fire insurance companies carrying risks against losses by fire within the limits of the city of Astoria, do, on behalf of the companies, respectfully request, respectfully protest against the proposed ordinance of the Rescued Steam fire engine from the city for thirty-six hours, at any time, but more particularly on the day set apart for the celebration of the independence of the United States, a day on which, as has been fully demonstrated in the records of fire insurance, more losses have been sustained than in any other one day of the year.

We further respectfully call the attention of your honorable committee to the fact, that every fire policy underwritten in this city is based upon an application signed by the insured, and the policy is granted upon the understanding and agreement between the insurers and the insured, that the statements made and subscribed to in said application are true. In each of said applications the fire insurance companies represent in jeopardy, but that the force and virtue of the policies issued by these companies in the city is insured, are also in jeopardy in case of fire occurring during the absence of Rescued fire engine, because it is distinctly stipulated and conditioned in said policies that "if there be neglect or deviation from the laws or police regulations made to prevent accidents from fire, as represented in application, then, and in every such case, this policy shall be void." Therefore, while fully acknowledging and admitting the claims of the Rescued fire engine company No. 2, to any favor that could possibly be conferred upon them, not conflicting with the public interests, yet for their constant alacrity and perfect efficiency, in justice to both insurers and insured, we are most reluctantly, and against our own better judgment, being our honorable committee not to permit the Rescued fire engine to be removed from the city of Astoria on the fourth of July.

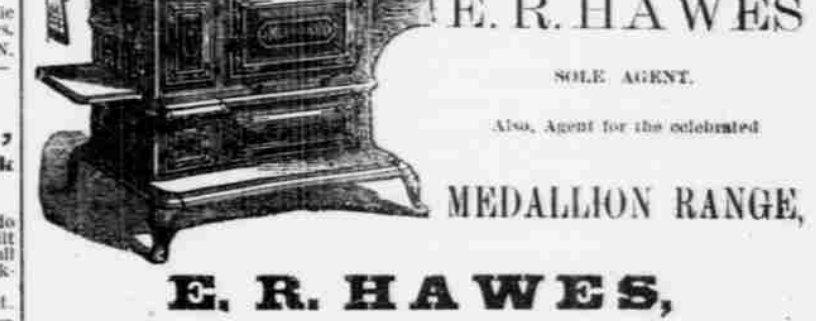

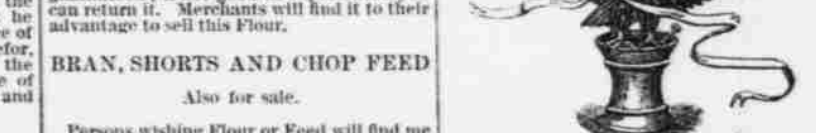
