 —Oregon due; Columbia to sail.  
 —Col. Gillespie, Major of Engineers, is in the city.  
 —Dr. and Mrs. Aug. C. Kinney are passengers on the incoming steamer.  
 —Large quantities of wool from eastern Oregon continue to arrive every day.  
 —Special auction sale to-morrow morning at eleven o'clock at Holdens auction rooms. See new ads.  
 —A larger amount of drift wood than usual is afloat in the harbor and bay of Astoria, because of the high tides.  
 —Senator Grover is a passenger by the Oregon. Also Mr. Carl Adler, Mr. J. J. Scotchler and wife, John W. Meldrum.  
 —Mr. J. A. Riperton has taken the general agency for the sale of the productions of the Astoria boat and shoe factory.  
 —Mr. C. A. McGures horse Record was taken to Portland yesterday by his trainer Johnny Wall, to prepare for the races July 20th.  
 —If a good report follows the present exploration in the Nehalem, the building of the railroad from Astoria will begin at once. We hope for the best.  
 —Capt. Geo. J. Ainsworth was in the city last evening on business in connection with the proposed Oregon Railway and Navigation company's improvements at Astoria.  
 —Capt. Cleveland Rockwell has just taken from his case a beautiful little water color entitled Early Morning in Bakers Bay. Its view is towards Fort Canby, with several harbor vessels neatly portrayed.  
 —The remains of Mr. N. Benson were consigned to the grave last evening, attended by Beaver lodge of Odd Fellows, of which he was a member. The particulars of the drowning of Mr. Benson, and the recovery of the body, have been published heretofore.  
 —A man by the name of John O'Connor died suddenly in a home of ill fame on Concomly street yesterday morning. The body was taken in charge by Coroner Franklin who held an inquest. The jury returned a verdict of death from heart disease.  
 —The names and numbers of several fishing boats that were out on Sunday, in violation of law, were taken on the 19th, for the purpose of handing the same over to the district attorney. It is not safe to send boats out on Sunday because prosecution is certain. Fish are scarce, but the catch will not justify the violation.  
 —Judge Roney is afflicted with a superabundant supply of Jobs comforters just now, and here is a specimen of the offerings made to him by friends in alleviation of his misery and distress of mind:  
 A beautiful maid of Carlisle,  
 On the back of neck had a bisie,  
 When her lover forgot,  
 And hugged the sore spot,  
 Her screams could be heard for a mile!  
 —The vicissitudes of the fishing business are multitudinous, but none are more perplexing than to have a net picked up by a person who ought to feel liberally disposed, but when it comes to settling for it, has the heart to ask nearly as much as the property is worth for simply saving it. Not long since Mr. Quinn had a net and boat come in through the surf on North beach. He went over to recover his property, and was confronted with a bill of \$150. The claimant finally came down to \$125, then to \$100, and finally to \$75. This was more than Mr. Quinn could bear, and he then offered to leave the net and boat with the parties if they would give him \$60. The upshot was that he paid them \$50 and came away with his property. This is but one instance. Hundreds of similar outrages have been perpetrated, and it is this disposition among men that is driving this interest to the wall.

**Past Steamers.**  
 The steamers Wide West and Fleetwood are said to be the fastest flyers in Pacific coast waters. It is undeniable that the fastest boats on the Pacific coast are now found on the Columbia river. Years ago the boat making nine or ten miles an hour on the lordly stream was considered fast. Within the last three or four years the Oregon Railway and Navigation company have made boats which turn a wheel at the rate of sixteen and even nineteen miles an hour. The Wide West is a very fast boat, and perhaps the most elegant river boat on the coast. But the Washington, constructed by a Vancouver company, carries the boom; and it will be moving a long day before it can be taken from her. On a recent trip, when put up to her last speed, she made the remarkable time of twenty-two and a half miles per hour. She is the most handsome boat in Oregon, as she is the fastest. She is doing a good business in the way of excursions just now. The Fleetwood has just put on a new propeller at Astoria and returns to her route. A contemporary thus describes her:  
 Capt. Scott's handsome little propeller the Fleetwood, made its trial trip from the foot of Morrison street this morning. The steamer passed up the water front of the Willamette to Ross island and then turning started for the mouth of the Willamette. She ran under a good head of steam, but not to her highest capacity, and reached the Columbia and sighted Vancouver in just fifty minutes, being a distance of 121 miles. On the return trip the steamer let herself out a link or two and made the run in forty-nine minutes despite a strong head wind. With proper ballast on board, the Fleetwood will make fifteen miles per hour easily. The steamer runs very prettily, and all who were on board were pleased with the trip. The Fleetwood is 115 feet long, with 19 feet width of beam. Her engines were made at Henryman's foundry, and are 10-horse power. There are two cabins, both elegantly upholstered, and everything about the boat is arranged with regard to economy and utility. The steamer has a carrying capacity for 250 passengers, and can carry fifty tons of freight. The Fleetwood will run to the Cascades, where she will connect with the Grand Dust for the Dalles. Capt. F. B. Scott will have command, Mr. G. Cox will be purser, and Henry Drake, engineer. We predict a successful career for the Fleetwood.  
 The Hayward and the Fleetwood started out for a race from the Astoria dock yesterday morning at six o'clock, followed by the government steamer Lincoln, all for Portland.

**Ladies on Tillamook Rock.**  
 Yesterday Mr. J. A. Gillespie and Miss Eunice T. Perkins, and Mr. F. C. Norris of THE ASTORIAN, and his sister, Miss Lizzie R. Norris, visited Tillamook rock, on board the Astoria, and landed upon the rock. This is the first time that ladies have landed at the rock, and the incident is worthy of much more than passing notice. They were congratulated by all, upon landing; and were particularly well received by Mr. Rowe and Mr. Holt. They speak in glowing terms of the delights of the excursion, and inform us that the published account of our visit to the rock, "in our imagination," was substantially correct, with one material exception. Where we say: "None would wish to go again, etc." the ladies exclaim: "Oh, we want to go again!" Well, certainly, they deserve credit for their courage, and while we freely admit that we were timid about the matter, in refusing to accept the proffer of a ride in the cage from the steamer to the rock, we will take their word for it that the sensation was delightful, and when we go the next time will endeavor to profit by their experiences. But two persons can go at one time in the cage, so the ladies drew straws, and Miss Perkins drawing the long straw went first, accompanied by Mr. Gillespie; Mr. and Miss Norris went next. They spent the time on the rock most agreeably.

**Slandered.**  
 On the 23rd of last month the following miserably scandalous dispatch, purporting to convey an item of news from Oregon, appeared in the San Francisco Chronicle:  
 Portland, Oregon, May 23.—An old citizen of Clackamas county named Chitwood was caught by a neighbor in the woods in flagrant delinquency with his own daughter, and was badly beaten with a club. He has disappeared from his home leaving a sick wife.  
 Mr. Chitwood has taken steps to punish the persons who have been guilty of circulating such scandals about him. He is an old resident of Clackamas county, has no daughter living in that county, and no such circumstance as the one detailed ever occurred. He will employ a good smart attorney in this case and will make it warm for the scandal mongers. Concerning matters of this character a greater truth was never compressed into smaller compass than when Judge Black said: "Justice travels with a leaden heel, but strikes with an iron hand." In spite of delays, of technicalities, of avoidances, of all contrivances to postpone, defer, and stop the trial in causes such as this, there are incidents where at least the innocent have been vindicated, and in Mr. Chitwood's case no doubt the wrong doers will be punished. Slander, the assassin creeps up silently in the dark, and lays its victim bleeding at its feet. Malice the natural accomplice of slander, is yet more cowardly. Malice seeks to make innocent friendships the weapon of assassination. There is no protection so powerful, not even the brotherhood of man; that slander and malice cannot break it down, and there is no language that can adequately picture the distress. There is no redress but in the strong arm and majesty of the law, and we hope and trust that Mr. Chitwood, whom we have known for years, and known so well that when he says a statement is a lie it is such; we say: we hope he will push this matter just as far as possible. He is a poor man, but justice can be meted out to the poor as well as to the rich, else our forms of government and boasted liberties are but idle mockery. We should like to see manhood triumph and feel that the voice of slander and malice can be silenced at least once forever.
