 Capt. Flavel will leave for Portland to-day, to be in attendance at the Salem fair.
 The funeral of Mr. Benj. Johnson was largely attended yesterday by sympathizing friends.
 If butlers wagons leave the road for half an hour the people think it is a terrible long time.
 What has become of the proposed Clatsop county jockey club, and Knappa agricultural society?
 On and after the first of July the Ilwaco company will run a daily line to the furts from Astoria.
 Mr. Joseph Higgins who was badly hurt by falling from a building recently, is now out of danger.
 The Canby laid over at Knappa night before last, and towed a big raft of logs to Knappton yesterday.
 The Columbia arrived down yesterday morning, but was delayed here taking cargo till late in the afternoon.
 We hope that by to-morrow we shall be able to announce particulars of the Fourth of July celebration at Astoria.
 We are informed that the Lurline has beaten the time of the Washington on the Vancouver route. The Lurline is one of the fastest and most handsome of the Oregon fleet.
 Mr. F. M. Bartholow manager of R. D. Humes Bay View business, says that this season the fishermen up river have caught seventy-five per cent. more fish than the bar fishermen.
 From the account of the Pacific coast pearl fisheries given to-day, it will be seen that one thousand divers produce \$500,000 gross value of ornaments, as against the gross value of 10,000 to 15,000 operatives on the Columbia river, who put up fish. This is proof enough that the stomachs of men and women are robbed for gew-gaws which will please the eye.
 Sheriff Twombly was found on the streets yesterday with his coat sleeve covered with white-wash. He was accosted by an anxious inquirer with: 'Hello Mac; been leanin' up agin' the new county jail, have ye? Mac looked fierce, with blood in his eye, as he replied gruffly: 'Jail, hell. His confidence in the new jail project has been somehow or another slunked.

From Ounalaska, via South Bend
 EDITOR ASTORIAN:
 Your favor of 17th inst. received to-day, and in reply to your inquiries, will say that the schooner H. S. Tierman is from Ounalaska, Captain bay, Ilinlik harbor, Amaknak island, Behring sea, about 600 miles westerly from Alaska. Amaknak island is one of the Aleutian islands. The mail matter was from Alaska Commercial company, to their house in San Francisco. Capt. Mitchell left Unalaska the latter part of May, was seventeen days to South bend. He reports the Corwin there preparing for her expedition to the Arctic; in fact, she sailed the same day he did and gave him a tow to sea. The steamer St. Paul was there. The Tierman arrived here on the 13th inst., went on to her dry dock at 8-o'clock landing, cleaned and painted, and is now loaded with spruce lumber, about 165,000 feet; also 200 sacks of oysters from R. Marion and about sixty sacks for other parties. She sails to-morrow for San Francisco. The writer got a glimpse of THE ASTORIAN to-day and see you report the Tierman as having sailed for South bend on the 13th inst. We are advised by Mr. Perkins, 10th inst., that she goes to Coos bay this time, and the Orient will probably come here. Yours truly,

Important Decision
 On the night of March 24, 1877, the hull of the steamer Rockaway, built at Norfolk, Virginia, was taken by the steamer Wynoke, of the Old Dominion line, to be towed to New York. As the vessel passed fort Monroe, the attention of the captain of the Wynoke was called to the government storm signals, but they were disregarded by him. Subsequently the storm became violent, and the Rockaway was wrecked. The owner of the Rockaway brought suit against the Old Dominion company to recover damages to the amount of \$40,000. The main plea of the plaintiff was that the captain of the Wynoke, in disregarding the storm signals, failed to exercise due diligence and precaution for the protection of the property in his care. The case was recently decided, the jury returning a verdict for the plaintiff, giving him \$25,018 37, with 5 per cent allowance.
 If the census bureau cannot get up more accurate statistics than this, they might as well shut up shop. "Census" returns show the total number of persons employed in the fisheries in the Pacific states and territories to be 16,745, of which 7,910 are Aleuts, Esquimaux and Indians, and about 4,000 Chinese; 3,036 are in California, 6,835 in Oregon, and 744 in Washington territory. Total value of boats, vessels and outfit, \$1,788,183. There is not a single statement in the above quotation but falls fully one hundred per cent below the truth, except it be perhaps with respect to the Esquimaux and Indians. There is today not less than 85,000,000 alfalfa in this river, in the shape of nets, boats, etc.

Ordinance No. 409.
 An ordinance granting to the Western Union Telegraph company the privilege of placing telegraph poles and lines in the public streets of the city of Astoria.
 Section 1. That the Western Union Telegraph company is hereby granted the right and privilege of erecting, stretching, operating and maintaining its telegraph poles and wires over and along any and all streets, alleys, lanes and public places of the city of Astoria. Provided, That the same shall at all times be so used, erected, stretched, maintained and kept as not to interfere with the free and unobstructed passage and use of said streets for travel and provided further, That the company erecting said poles and wires shall be and is hereby held to the same in its judgment and the interests require, change, modify, limit, or forfeit the rights and privileges here-in granted, the free and unobstructed supervision of the committee on streets and public ways.

Resolves Reply.
 To the citizens and tax payers of the City of Astoria:
 Through your efforts in the year 1877, Rescued Engine company was placed in possession of one of the finest steam engines on the north Pacific coast, and from that day to this we have done our duty as firemen, and without a single exception our company has been first to put water upon the fire when ever our city has been threatened with a conflagration. Believing that from the day we received our steamer up to the 13th day of June, 1881 that we were risking life and limb for the protection of the property and lives of those who had given us an engine for that purpose. But in THE DAILY ASTORIAN of June 19th we were notified in an arrogant and contemptuous manner that we were making our life and limb risk for the protection of the property of London, Liverpool, Hamburg, Imperial, North British, Queen and London, and other companies, while they sit back in their gilded palaces, in foreign lands, we the poor firemen of the city of Astoria, who have the honor of being the fire department as their officers acts well show, are the least mentioned in the insurance companies. In fact, when our city was almost as densely populated as it is to-day, the insurance upon property was seven per cent; and in 1878, when we received our steamer, the insurance was raised to eight, nine and ten per cent. And now that we have two steamers, a stationary fire engine and hose, and ladder, and all the latest fire department in the United States—(their own words) they are compelling the insurance to pay, eleven and twelve and one-half per cent. Don't they value our efficient fire department? Who are we working for? Now a few words in answer to the question: What are the elements to the committee for effect? First, in each of said applications the insurance company applied for is assumed to be an answer to the question: What are the facilities for extinguishing fires in your town? Now, after the examination of over twenty applications to pay, eleven and twelve and one-half per cent, and find no such question, only in the application for canaries, and then the question is this: What are your facilities in regard to the fire department? And nothing is mentioned in regard to steam fire engines being always on hand; and they sign around the block with their engines, and then they come to justify the contract; an organization as foreign to a volunteer fire department as the insurance companies themselves, who have never contributed one cent to the fire department of the city of Astoria. And now in conclusion we wish to assure you that we are confident that we will every try and be as efficient in the future as we have been in the past.
