Rescue Engine company No. 2 have secured the steamer Lurline for their excursion to Portland, and will leave Browns dock at twelve o'clock on Sunday. A limited number of tickets only will be sold, at the rate of \$2.50 for the round trip.

Miss Ellen Courzen of San Francisco, was chosen by the literary committee for the Fourth of July celebration in that city, from quite a number of prominent local vocalists, to sing the Star Spangled Banner at the Grand Opera House.

Mr. C. J. Smith, of Brookfield, "got away" with that bear he has been hunting. He killed it on the 27th. It was a fine one; weighed about 400 pounds, and had been wounded by a charge of buckshot about the head, probably by Peter Lowtz, two miles down the river from Brookfield.

Besides these there are four barges ranging in size from 1100 to 633 tons, and several others not registered. When the railroad is finished to Portland the Astoria fleet will be largely increased.

The company are owners of a fleet of four iron hull screw steamers as follows. The three first named have each two decks and two masts, and were bought of the Oregon Steamship company; the last with three decks and three masts, of John Roach, arriving for the first time in 1880.
