The Astoria Railroad.

Grading on the railroad from Astoria will be commenced as soon as the line is finished to The Dalles. It men could be obtained this work would be pushed immediately, but the company have not men enough now by two thousand, on work at present in process of construction. The company now have 2,700 men at work on the grade between the Cascades and the Dalles. The track has been laid nine miles up the river from the lower cascades and the grading will be done to Hood river, twenty-six miles, within ten days. Bridge and trestle work and track laying will follow the grade closely. The iron for the Astoria road has been contracted for, and will be laid down at Astoria when it arrives.

The Oregonian charges that money has been offered to bribe J. S. Keller, J. B. Kellogg, and N. B. Honeyman severally, members of the common council of Portland, in the interest of Hon. A contemporary says: A newspaper and a newspaper editor that people do not talk about and sometimes abuse are rather poor concerns. The free lands of the west are being taken up and settled this year to a degree most gratifying, in the face of the over-crowded mechanical departments of metropolitan life. Several millions more acres of homesteads have been entered for settlement at the various land offices this year than in the past year, and still the western movement continues in force. And this is the only solution of the labor trouble. Let the unemployed come and become producers instead of consumers.

We see how life gets conined at our mind, so that the world somehow wears the stamp of the die cut into our hearts. We know how a piece of good fortune brightens the air; how some impending evil puts the edge of a spiritual eclipse upon the sun; how suddenly ill fortune in business will seem to make the very springs of beauty bankrupt; how the sickness of a dear friend turns nature pallid; how the death of one whom we love will convert all the trees to cypresses and the music of the universe becomes a requiem; but how can you expect your city to prosper if you do not patronize the local press? How can you succeed as a merchant, or a mechanic, and not advertise?

Whenever you want to buy an article, purchase it from a store-keeper in town. You know them, they are identified with you in the interest of keeping up the city, which is an organization for mutual protection, and if you are cheated you know where to apply for redress. When you buy of an itinerant pedlar, whom you may never see again, if you are cheated you must pocket your own losses.

The time has long since passed when mechanical trades provided our sons with a living. Labor-saving machinery, patent tools and steam have robbed the trade of the future it offered to our boys in the days of the indentured apprenticeship system. The filers and doings of our metropolitan cities are composed largely of tradesmen and professional men, and merchandising is a failure, if the number of bankrupt merchants who had to succumb to the pressure of the times can be taken as a criterion. What the country needs is producers, and the waste fields of unutilized land offers an opportunity to place the rising generation in the way of making names for themselves and better times for posterity.
