—The Argonaut carries a handsome set of flags. They were all displayed as she lay at anchor in Bakers bay on Sunday.

—Walter Russell was discharged upon examination before Justice Fox, on a charge of assaulting Chinese at the oil works.

—Capt. J. G. Mautler drove over the new wagon road to Williamsport on Sunday, with a team and carriage, accompanied by his family.

—The barkentine North Bend discharged her powder at the magazine below Portland yesterday. She has two locomotives on board which will be discharged to-day.

—A four legged chicken is owned in this city. Mr. Clough exhibited it to us a few evenings since, at our office. It is a lively spring rooster, and all four legs and feet are well defined.

A Shower of Fish.

Last week a small fish was left at this office, which was said to have fallen upon the street in a rain shower. We sent it to Mr. C. J. Smith, of Brookfield, for identification. Mr. Smith was unable to classify it, but thinks it most resembles a small stickleback. He was not inclined to invest largely in the story of its having "rained down," but admitted that such thing was not absolutely impossible, as small animals are sometimes taken up by whirlwinds and waterpots, and considerable distances. But this is not the time of year when such things are likely to occur. It is not possible, however, for our informant to be mistaken; and in confirmation of his statement, we find the following in a Portland paper of Thursday last: The Republican says: "A lumberman named Rhodes, who resides in the neighborhood of Westport on the Columbia river, came up on the Astoria boat yesterday evening and put up at the Minnesota house. He brought with him a pickle jar filled with live fish averaging an inch and a half in length, and of the genus orthogoriscus, or sun fish class. Mr. Rhodes says that about half past seven a heavy dark cloud passed over his cabin, which is away from any stream or swamp, and of a sudden it commenced to rain heavily. A flash of lightning and a light clap of thunder were followed by a shower of fish, which kept coming down for about ten seconds. The little fellows kicked and squirmed along the ground, and Rhodes succeeded in gathering up the jar full of live ones before they gave up the ghost. When seen last night they were swimming about as though their fall had not injured them at all. Mr. Rhodes left this morning for Eugene to present the jar to the faculty of the State University. The gentleman looks like an honest and unpretentious man, and asserts that his story is true and can be verified. We give it for what it is worth."

Body Found.

To the Hon. J. Q. A. Borvly, Judge of County Court of Clatsop county, Oregon.

Having been notified this day of a dead body washed ashore on Clatsop beach, near Mr. P. Condit's place, I went to said place and found the dead body of a man of the following description: Height, six feet, fair complexion, light hair and a light mustache. He had four shirts on, one heavy red woolen over-shirt, one check over-shirt, one new white shirt and one blue flannel under-shirt, one pair blue flannel drawers, a pair cassimere pants, dark plaid, a pair of No. 9 shoes buckled on the side, and a pair of woolen socks; no marks of any description on the body, and nothing in the pockets of his clothes. I had a coffin made and took the body around up on the sand ridge, back of Mr. West's farm, and buried it, placed a board at the grave and marked it unknown. The expenses incurred are: Coroners fees, \$5 00; mileage, six miles and return, \$1 20; for coffin, \$2 00; for burying, \$1 50; for team to haul body up from the beach, \$5 00. All of which I respectfully submit to the County Court.
