The railroad war is about as hot as the weather, about Chicago.

Forty deaths per day of sun stroke are reported in Cincinnati.

The eventuality of war with France is openly discussed in Madrid cafes and the coming election are for the moment forgotten.

A posse of thirty men are in pursuit of the Rook Island train robbers. Escape is impossible. The notorious James brothers are amongst the robbers.

Plans are being talked up of a way to get the President to the sea side. He will probably be taken around to Long branch by steamer, as the motion of a railway train would be hurtful.

It is rumored that the Central Pacific railway will connect at Granger with the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy. This will make two through lines with the Northern Pacific railroad to Oregon.

A Guymas dispatch says that the federal judge there has refused permission to Sam Brannan to have his lands surveyed, and his engineers have gone to the city of Mexico. Brannan has appealed to the federal government and will soon return to San Francisco to await developments.

The Episcopalians of Jobstown, an obscure village in Jersey, where Lorillard keeps his horses, are happy. He promised if he won the Derby he would build a new church for them, and they say he always keeps his word. Troquois may be said then to have won a big victory both for religion and Yankee horse flesh.

Lieut. Ray, of the United States signal corps, sailed from San Francisco on the 18th, with nine companions on the schooner Golden Fleece for point Barrow, Arctic ocean, where he will establish a station for meteorological observation. Houses ready for erection, instruments for observations, and provisions for three years are comprised in the outfit of the expedition.

A singular story comes from the Line Islands in the south seas. A Sandwich Islander, who had embraced christianity, carried the cross into one of the islands. He founded a temporal kingdom, and persuaded the natives to choose the pleasant paths of peace, and turn over to him their spears and war clubs. The missionary ruler soon proved to be exacting, but when his subjects showed signs of mutiny, he gathered together a select body guard, made an onslaught upon the defenseless islanders, and killed about a thousand of them. He has been taken to Honolulu to be tried for his peculiar method of spreading the gospel.

About 250,000 pounds of wool will be shipped direct to the east from southern Oregon.

Dr. D. S. Baker, of Walla-walla, is about to build a large and costly flouring mill in that city, or within range of the wheat fields.

Mrs. L. C. Sorverance of St. Johns, has sent to the Oregonian specimens of four, five, six and seven leaved clover, which are quite a botanical curiosity. They were all plucked from a small sod not a foot square.

There are three cases of small-pox reported, and possibly more, in Portland. The papers up there make no mention of this fact. When the small-pox was in Astoria, THE ASTORIAN published full particulars. There is a great impropriety in suppressing such information.

Capt. Blinn, of Olympia, is in eastern Washington, where he has many and varied valuable interests, land, stock, mines, etc. Capt. Blinn believes that the region below the Columbia river and east of the Cascade mountains, is the best portion of the whole grassy belt of America. It is exceedingly fertile, and is almost boundless.

Crops are splendid everywhere east of the mountains. A correspondent in Yakima inquires: But what are we to do with the surplus, with no railroad to carry it away? A sample of wheat in our office from the farm of Polly and Imbrie, is evidence of the fact that people of that region ought to have a railroad. And they will. Capt. Kingsbury's party of surveyors are in there now locating the line. Once located, it will soon be built. That is Mr. Villards way of doing things.
