Condition of the President.

The record of the presidents case is one of steady improvement. Little can be added in the way of details to facts in official bulletins and telegrams to consulting surgeons. The doctors seem to have one language for the public and another for private persons, but the confidence of the people in the recovery of the president has not been shaken.

From Alaska.

The California broke her cylinder head near Pearl straits and proceeded, after a short delay, with one engine, and arrived at Harrisburg on the 11th inst. She went to the new wharf, which is now completed, and is certainly one of the best north of Portland. Very little work has been done on ledges, but the prospects look better than ever. Ledges are showing up well and have every appearance of being solid and permanent. A mail service has been established between Sitka and Harrisburg, in accordance with the petition forwarded last February. The hills are full of prospectors, many having gone far into the interior. New locations and discoveries have been made, but none of any great value. The citizens of Harrisburg have issued a call for a convention for the purpose of sending a representative to Washington, who will be instructed to urge upon the government the necessity for the establishment of some form of government and laws. The California will go to San Francisco from Paget-sound. Prospects of an election in Albany are no better than last week. Canadian Pacific railroad shareholders passed resolutions authorizing the issue of \$25,000,000 for bonds. The first locomotive for the California Southern railroad has arrived at San Diego per brig Oriant from San Francisco. Seven cargoes of railway iron now afloat, and five loading, will be laid down in western Oregon and Washington as soon as it arrives. An agent of a Kentucky liquor house says his firm is "well pleased with the demand for their whisky in Oregon." It would be funny if they were not pleased. There will be a first-class tannery in full operation in The Dalles within ninety days from date. There is no business in Wasco county with a capital of \$5,000 or \$10,000 that will pay more handsomely. The Standard says a man is in luck these times if he escapes being robbed, even if sober, but a drunken man stands no show at all, and strangers arriving in Portland had better deposit their coin in the safe of their hotel. The government steamers Wachusett, McArthur, and Hassler, have left San Francisco. The Wachusett goes to Sitka to relieve the Jamestown, which is ordered home; the Hassler is bound for Alaska, and the McArthur goes north on a general survey. Colonel Mendel, assistant engineer Payson, and commissioner Knox have visited the brush dams of Yuba and Bear rivers, California, and report them in a flourishing condition. The dams were not so badly injured by the freshets as was thought, and, except in a few spots where breaks occurred, the willows are growing in a way to strengthen them. They are not designed to impound the water until it forms a stagnant pool. This fine sand will float along and settle in the waters of the bay and harbor of San Francisco. It is impossible to avoid this result. The brush dam system might be useful to hold in check the debris now in the mountain streams; but as a remedy for the evil of hydraulic mining, they are entitled to little consideration. 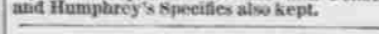
