The town of Colfax was nearly destroyed by fire on the 22d. Losses \$105,000. No fire department. The fire was the work of an incendiary.

A number of rumors have been in circulation regarding the sudden disappearance of Henry T. Lewis, a clerk in the Angle-Californian bank, San Francisco. It is now pretty well settled that he is a defaulter to the amount of about \$6000, invested in fast horses and fast women.

A storm did considerable damage in Massachusetts on the 22d. Lightning struck in many places burning barns, killing borses, shattering flagstaffs, telegraph poles, trees, etc., and a large quantity of window glass was broken by flying missiles and hail stones. Half a dozen prostrations of people are reported, but no fatal cases.

The wreck of a wild freight train on the Santa Fe road near Lawrence, Kansas, on the 22d, discloses a bold plot to rob a passenger train on which an express messenger had thirty or forty thousand dollars in the safe. A shop near the track had been broken into and tools obtained with which to tear up the rails. The wild Wednesday Afternoon, July 27. freight went into the break.

The employes of the branch of the Matanzas of the Spanish bank of Cuba fled on the 22d with two accomplices on board a Spanish ST. MARY'S HOSPITAL steamer, which one of the accomplices chartered under the pretence that he intended to ship cattle from Alvarado, Mexico. The employes robbed the office of \$200,000 in specie. The bank officers say that the amount stolen is not fully ascertained. The steamer left Maianzas on the 19th.

Another severe storm in the northwest is reported. A Chicago Lost, Three hun dispatch of the 22d says: Several cases are reported of lightning P striking in the city, but there was no great damage. 
