**Condition of the President.**

In Washington, New York, and many other places, last Saturday, excitement was almost as great and painful as on the day the president was shot, in consequence of a chill which attacked the president at 8 o'clock. This chilly shaking sensation lasted until 9 o'clock when fever set in and rose rapidly. His pulse went up to 130, and temperature 101. In an hour or so the fever declined some. The doctors were not able to define the cause of the change. The cabinet ministers were all sent for and there was a great deal of uneasiness in the city growing out of the fact that nothing definite could be ascertained from the surgeons. At half-past one o'clock yesterday morning he was resting quietly.

**Jerre and Bob.**

The August number of the North American Review devotes a liberal supply of its space to a polemical duel between Col. Ingersoll, the great exponent of the unbelief of the day, and Judge Jeremiah Black, the eminent jurist. Col. Ingersoll is master of some of the most effective arts of the rhetorician and the popular orator. As an assailant of revealed religion he has more chance of success of confirming the skeptical and carrying away the wavering than perhaps any other infidel of modern times. He is engaged in constant aggressive attack, and the audiences that applaud him afford evidence that he is producing effect. Judge Black is distinguished alike for his steadfast faith in orthodox christianity and for the power and skill with which he is able to sustain any cause in which his convictions are enlisted. He is, like the challenger, a man of the world in his serious occupations and modes of thought. He is accustomed to contests in the arena of public discussion and to the use of all the weapons of controversy by which men are convinced; he is familiar with the arguments that have been used by the defenders of his cause, and he has the nerve and vigor of a born disputant. Col. Ingersoll has made his attack and sustained it with all his force as an aggressive assailant. Judge Black has taken up the challenge as the champion of christianity. It is well that the daring infidel should be called out and that he should be met by such an antagonist. The cause of truth can suffer nothing from a contest of this kind. Of the merits of the battle it is for an interested public to judge.

W. E. Sheridan and the company supporting him, will visit Oregon.

On Saturday Virginia City, Nevada, was modestly shaken by an earthquake.

Lieut. Fred. G. Schwatka, of north pole fame, is coming on the next steamer.

Infernal machines have been discovered at Liverpool in barrels shipped from America. The machines were encased in zinc boxes, clockwork style, prepared with dynamite.

The Nihilists assassinated one of their own last week who had been communicating with the police in St. Petersburg. This assassination enabled the police to make other important arrests.

The steamer Dora, from Ounaslaska, brought Rufus B. Bourdocks, hereditary chief of the Aleut Indians, on a visit of curiosity to San Francisco. The Aleut Indians are suffering from a fatal epidemic which has carried off a large number of the tribe.

We don't take any stock in the telegram which informs Mr. Nash that three steamers are en route to Yaquina bay from Cardiff with 6000 tons of iron for the Yaquina bay railroad. In the first place, steamers capable of carrying 2000 tons of railroad iron would be unable to get into Yaquina bay; and again steamers would probably not be engaged in such business. It is a very improbable story.

Chief Justice Lord has declined to settle the question of title to the mayoralty of Portland.

An earthquake occurred Friday morning at 2 o'clock in eastern France and Switzerland, and bells were rung at Geneva and houses shaken. No casualties.

A Paris dispatch of the 23d says the nihilists have held a great and solemn meeting of the executive committee, and resolved to warn the czar once more, and then if he doesn't heed it he and his advisers will perish.

Every day strengthens the opinion we entertain that work upon the railroad will begin at Astoria at an early day. Within thirty days trains will be running to Pendleton. They are now running from The Dalles to Dayton and Spokane falls. Before the Columbia closes with ice the city of Portland will be in communication with The Dalles. Men are so scarce now that work cannot be commenced here while there is such demand for them up there. Once here the work can be pushed all winter to good advantage, which cannot be done so well east of the mountains.

A correspondent of the New York Sun, referring to how they "fixed" Theophilus French on his trip out here, says that French and his wife and niece and the two treasury clerks and their wives, were furnished with a hotel Pullman car from Washington via the Southern Pacific railroad to San Francisco, and return via the Central and Union Pacific, and were amply and bountifully supplied with wines, eatables and all other creature comforts so much envied by government employees upon such occasions as this excursion proves to have been. The whole trip was made at the expense of the railroads, but vouchers were all the same filed for expenditures made by the party and the whole amount charged to our good old Uncle.
