How Is This?

The large iron ship Derbyshire, just finished loading at Astoria, is one of a class which we claim is cheaper to be loaded at Astoria than at Portland. She has been loaded entirely at Astoria with wheat and flour, and now draws twenty-two feet as ready for sea.

The ship has been charged a wharfage here of twenty-five cents per ton, amounting to the sum of four hundred and eighty dollars. This charge, it is claimed, is an unreasonable and unwarranted charge; not customary at this port nor at Portland. As the dock that the ship has been loaded at is owned and controlled by a Portland company, it is thought that the exaction of this charge is a direct thrust at Astoria's shipping; a thing gotten up to discourage any other vessels in the future chartering for Astoria loading.

There have been quite a number of vessels loaded entirely at Astoria this season prior to the Derbyshire. Amongst them may be named the Lanarkshire, Glen-peris and Scottish Bard. None of these vessels, we are told, have been charged any wharfage. The wharfage has been charged, as is the custom at Portland, to the shipper and not to the ship. We will not comment particularly on this charge and only give it as it was given to us. If it is true, we think however it is of sufficient moment for our Chamber of Commerce to address a letter to Mr. Villard thereon. This company will soon be asking Astoria to ship her fifteen or twenty thousand tons of canned salmon yearly to New York by their railroad, instead of by the Central Pacific railroad. Such a company can hardly continue to make such discriminations against Astoria as the Derbyshire charge.

Politics.

The poor man who looks for political preferment may thank his lucky stars that his birth-place was east in America. There are a great many men in the country who are not ashamed to have people know that they are poor in pocket. Society, indeed, is so rich that a man of considerable means may as well have nothing. With a nonchalance which is quite novel, these people announce themselves as poor, avoid society and work their way upward. This can be done in the United States, but not in England—scarcely in Europe outside of France, since France became a republic.

There is no road to political success in England excepting through Parliament; and every election excludes more and more of the less conspicuous candidates for popular favors, for none other reason than their want of means to prosecute their object. In proof of this, Mr. Waldegrave Leslie, a man of high attainments, good birth and great personal popularity, publicly confessed that he retired from Parliament solely on account of insufficient money to meet the demand on him as a candidate before the people.

A man who stands for a county in the English Parliament must have at least \$30,000 to expend for the position; and one who seeks to represent only a borough needs \$5,000. After gaining his position, while it is not impossible for him to maintain himself in a modest way in London, unless he has an income of five or six thousand dollars a year he will lose his popularity and his position together. The rich distrust his motives and the poor affect to despise him. The latter like their member to make a display, while the former seek to hamper him notwithstanding his character and ability; and the suggestion comes increased force with each

renewal that he would probably succeed better in some other district. There is no salary attached to the position of member of the English Parliament, and there is therefore no possible means of subsistence during an incumbency save by a revenue from extraneous sources.

It is a strange objection to paying their members which the English advance. They hold that a salary would make the position the aim of mercenary men, and that, as the lower classes could and would live at so much less expense than those of the higher class, that the Parliament would be filled from the lower walks of life. The object of the English leaders appears to be to wall out the people from the legislative chambers of the government. The system of education furthers this object. A constituency may pay its member, and by this means a poor man might work his way into Parliament if he had the necessary ability, education and vim to make the fight for preference. But the system of educating the English youth is so costly that it is virtually beyond the reach of any but the rich.

Progress.

SIXTY-FIVE thousand feet of lumber are sawed in Astoria every day; three years ago fifteen thousand feet was the daily product. Of that daily yield there is not a foot sent away. It is all used in building, right here in Astoria; a saw-mill across the river and one up the river are sending all they saw over here, and all together cannot supply the demand. Buildings contracted for three months ago are not begun yet; "we can't get lumber," is what the carpenters say. The mills are running day and night, and have sold months in advance, every foot they cut. Is there any other town in Oregon or anywhere else on the coast that can say as much for the present and future outlook?

The Government has finally begun to see the "true inwardness" of the Arizona "Indian war," and peace may be looked for now any day. Not a solitary Indian was killed, not a single pioneer, miner or any other man, who minded his own business, was molested, but several enterprising men made a million or so apiece out of the scare; and it was started for no other purpose. Crook broke the Apaches' backbone years ago; the poor wretches haven't vim enough left to fight a coyote.

A CHARLOTTE, S. C., firm distributed \$500,000 in Confederate money at the Atlanta Exposition with their advertisement printed on the back of the bills.
