A splendid lot of Eastern Oysters just arrived by the State of California at Tom Smith's Oyster Saloon, Main street.

A. E. Starr, of Prairie City, recently shot and killed Jeff Parry, of that place, because he would not marry his daughter, with whom he had been keeping company for some time.

It is reported that The Dalles Military Road Company have sold out their interest to English capitalists, who intend to put the road in thorough repair, and so construct it that it can be traveled at all seasons of the year, from The Dalles, via Canyon City, to old Fort Boise, on Snake river.

The barge Monarch with 500 tons of wheat on board, while on her way from the Cascades in tow of the Ordway, last Wednesday evening, ran on a snag near the mouth of the Willamette, and beached to prevent her from sinking. The cargo was removed to the barge Autocrat, and the Monarch was to this place to be repaired.

The Golden Fleece, lately arrived from the Arctic regions, brings the news that the mysterious Wrangel Land was found by the United States exploring and relief steamer Rodgers, to be an island about sixty miles long, with a current on the northern end, running to the northwest about six miles an hour. The Rogers made a complete circuit of the island and made a landing, but discovered nothing indicating that the exploring yacht Jeannette had ever been there.

In 1855, says the P. L., the average price of lumber in the Puget Sound district was \$15.50 per thousand; in 1865, \$10.19; in 1875, \$9.27, and since then it has not varied much, it being, this season, \$9.40. The decline is due to the increased number of mills, to competition, and to better facilities for handling logs and lumber.

Lecture.
Lieut. Schwatka, the famous Arctic explorer will lecture at Liberty Hall, next Monday evening on "Arctic Explorations," a subject on which no man living can more knowingly discourse. There is no history about his narrative. He tells of 3000 miles of Arctic exploration, of the discoveries of the remains of Sir John Franklin's expedition, of his advance to the pole two degrees farther north than any previous Arctic explorer, and tells it in a facile way that adds to the interest of the story. The London Times of September 25th, 1880, says: "Lieut. Schwatka has now resolved the last doubts which could have been felt. He has traced the untraced ships to their graves beneath the ocean, and cleared the reputation of a harmless people from an undeserved reproach. He has given to the unburied bones of the crews probably the only safeguard against desecration by wandering wild beasts and heedless Esquimaux which that frozen land allowed. He has brought home for reverent sepulture in a kinder soil the one body which bore transport. Over the rest he has set up monuments to emphasize the undying memory of their sufferings and their exploit. He has gathered tokens by which friends and relatives may identify their dead, and revisit in imagination the spots in which their ashes lie. Lastly he has carried home with him material evidence to complete the annals of Arctic exploration."

The gold medal was awarded at the recent Mechanics' Fair at Portland, for the best manufacturer's exhibit of Oregon-made boots and shoes; the bronze medal for the best exhibit of Oregon-made leather. Both medals are the highest prizes in the gift of the examining committee in that line of goods, and were awarded to Messrs. Leinenweber & Co. solely on the merits of the goods manufactured and exhibited by them.
