The British bark Loch Fergus arrived in yesterday. There are fifty three vessels still to arrive here this season. The Oklahama came down with the Trongate yesterday. The schooner Yaquina, from Yaquina Bay, is in the harbor. Max Wagner's San Francisco National brewery beer can't be beat.

Fifty cases of small pox are said to exist in the town of New Tacoma. It is expected that the new M. E. church will be ready for occupancy about New Year. \$2,650 was collected as poll tax from Portland Chinese during the past summer. Frank Fabre has oysters in every style. The Puget Sound Salmon Company put up 7,500 cases of silver salmon this year. There was a pleasant social at Mr. Van Dusen's Friday evening, and an unusually large number present. Residents of the Nehalem report heavy rain fall in that section, streams impassable and roads washed away. The Presbyterian synod of the Columbia began its sixth annual session in Salem last Thursday evening. The League of Freedom is the latest organization. It is intended to work against the enforcement of the Sunday law.

Findings of the Court. The court of inquiry relative to the late marine disasters on this coast, gave its findings last Friday. The court, composed of Vice-Consul Laddlaw, and Capt. Jarvis and Johnson of the British ships Thunderbolt and Trafalgar, were of the opinion that the captain of the Lammerlaw "committed a very grave error in judgment" in standing in toward Toke point lighthouse during the night. In the case of the Ferngren the court was of opinion that that vessel was wrecked through the fault of Capt. Bobb, whose certificate was suspended for four months. The second mates of both vessels were "reprimanded."
