 John Hunt, late postmaster at Nehalem, went out some time last week with a party of prospectors in the mountains, and last Friday afternoon, while climbing a spur of the range in company with three of his companions he suddenly stopped and complained of a pain in the region of the heart. He staggered and dropped; and when his comrades picked him up he was dead. They were a long way from home, and after carrying the body till quite exhausted, they found it impossible to reach the Nehalem, and buried the unfortunate deceased in a canyon, marking the ground for future identification.

—On account of suspension of trains beyond Walla Walla, points between that city and Dayton will not receive, and cannot send mail until travel is resumed.  
 —John Eccles, of Columbia county, has raised 575 pounds of turnips from a piece of ground containing one square rod, being at the rate of forty-six tons per acre.

 —Gov. Thayer has commuted the sentence of Joseph Marx, sent to the penitentiary from Clatsop county, for a term of five years from August 30, 1877, for the crime of larceny. Cause assigned for executive clemency, uniform good conduct and term of sentence being nearly expired.

**Thanksgiving Proclamation.**  
 EXECUTIVE OFFICE,  
 SALEM, OREG., NOV. 15, 1881.  
 Whereas for a long period of time a custom has prevailed for setting apart a day of thanksgiving to the God of the universe;  
 And whereas, his excellency the president of the United States in compliance therewith has issued his proclamation recommending "that all people observe Thursday, the 24th day of November inst., as a day of national thanksgiving and prayer by ceasing so far as may be from their secular labors and meeting in their several places of worship, there to join in ascribing honor to Almighty God, whose goodness has been so manifest in our history and in our lives, and offering our loudest prayers that his bounty may continue to us and our country;"

Now therefore, I, W. W. Thayer, governor of the state of Oregon, in view of the foregoing and through a respect for the opinions of others, do hereby appoint for the people of this commonwealth the day so recommended in said proclamation of the president of the United States as such a day of thanksgiving, and earnestly request all to observe it in accordance with said recommendation so far as consistent with their honest sentiments and convictions: In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the state to be hereto affixed. **Topographical Similarity.**  
 The master of the schooner R. B. Hardy, now lying at Portland, commenting in the Oregonian on the resemblance between the entrances to Shoalwater bay and the Columbia, says that the mistaking of Shoalwater bay for Columbia river is no new thing and may be very easily done, for the similarity is very striking. In the first place Leadbetter Point, or as it is often called the peninsula, is almost a duplicate of Clatsop beach and Point Adams. The Willapa hill back of Shoalwater bay resembles Chimco Point. There is also a saddle mountain that shows in clear weather south of the bay, that corresponds exactly with the one south of Astoria. And, finally, Cape Shoalwater, although not resembling Cape Disappointment when nearly approached, yet when seen from a distance of 18 or 20 miles, could be easily mistaken one for the other.

—The British ship Meranjer Franjee, 1079 tons, Bidwell master, 143 days from Liverpool; the British bark Annie Maine, 499 tons, Swan master, from Liverpool; Olive S. Southard and another bark, name unknown, are outside, the first three with pilots on board. The Southard has been standing off and on for a considerable time.

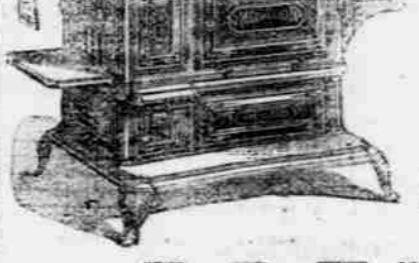
