Go Slow!

The Astorian ignorantly prints the
following paragraph, and a Portland
paper as ignorantly copies it:

It costs 63 shillings to take a ton of
wheat from San Francisco to Liverpool.
It costs from 80 to 92 shillings
to take a ton of wheat from the Col-
umbia to the same port. There's an
article on the "Columbia Bar" that
though short is full of meaning.

There can be no excuse for this
gross misstatement. *Oregonian* 17th
Inst.

In a hasty attempt to get in a kick
at the Standard over our shoulders,
the Oregonian accuses us of ignorance.
The Bulletin, a newspaper published
at San Francisco, Cal., and the Oregonian,
an alleged newspaper pub-
lished at Portland, Oregon, are our
authorities for "this gross misstate-
ment." The issue of the latter for
Nov. 1st, contains among its shipping
items the following San Francisco
shipping news, "San Francisco, Oct.
31st, chartered for wheat to Cork."
British ship Minster, 1499, 628
6d. British ship Drumpark, 1551,
60s." The same issue of our courteous
contemporary says, under the head of
"Finance and Commerce," "A British
bark of 650 tons, iron - is held at 85s.
direct, but finds no takers." Now,
personally, we have no objection to
the Oregonian and Standard adjusting
their respective liver pads and going
for one another, but we most decidedly
object to any attempt to tinge us in.
The Oregonian has got into a habit of
smearing at and sitting down upon its
up-country exchanges, and wants to
try it on down here. We won't have it.
We want to be set right in com-
mon with the rest of mankind, when
mistaken; but please don't start to
pick us up before we fall down. The
Oregonian assumes an air of infallibility
that to any man who ever spent
a few years in a newspaper office is
amusing in its appearance and absurd
in its effect. The point the Astorian
made in the publication of the item
was this: that while fully recognizing
all the facts in the case, the un-
certain states exists that by reason
of the present state of the Columbia
river bar the freighters for the Columbia,
are at entirely too high a figure.
Ship captains have told us the present
season that there is "big money" in
taking wheat from the Columbia to
the United Kingdom at 60s a ton,
even under the present disadvantageous
conditions of affairs.

Post-office authorities have de-
