The Trafalgar.

"Twas on Trafalgar Bay,
The French at anchor lay."
The British ship Trafalgar, which arrived in about three weeks ago, and proceeded to Portland for a portion of her cargo, is now lying at Flavel's dock taking on the remainder. At the time of her arrival we made mention of her size and tonnage, being the largest vessel that ever went up the Columbia from this port and the second largest of any arrival here. From Capt. Duncan Johnston we get additional information. She was built on the Clyde in 77; her carrying capacity is 57,120 cwt. She took on 40,000 cwt. at Portland and will lead to her full capacity, drawing when loaded, 21 feet 7 inches. Her length over all is 330 feet, breadth of beam 40 feet, depth of hold 23 feet 9 inches. She has made several quick voyages, among which may be mentioned her recent trip from Antwerp to San Diego, Cal., in 118 days. She is four-masted, square rigged, and is, the captain informs us, the easiest handled of any vessel of her class he ever saw. The yards on the jigger and mainmast can be swung at the same time, and with an experienced crew she can be made to tack or turn in twice her length. Her name is suggestive of victory, and seems fittingly bestowed on this fine specimen of marine architecture. The mention of the English fight at Trafalgar under Lord Nelson called up some reminiscences of that decisive engagement, which was fought Oct. 21st, 1805. There are still five British naval officers living who were with Nelson on that famous day, seventy-six years ago: Sir George Rose Sartorius, aged ninety-one, then midshipman on the Temeraire; Admiral Robert Patton, ninety-one, midshipman on the Belleophon; Commander William Vickary, aged ninety, volunteer on the Achilles; Commander Francis Harris, aged ninety, volunteer on the Temeraire; and Col. James Fynmore, aged ninety-two, midshipman on the Africa. Those of our readers who want to see an A. 1. vessel would do well to visit the Trafalgar before she sails for the United Kingdom.

International Fisheries Exhibition.

From a circular issued by high authorities and officials of Edinburgh, Scotland, we learn that an international fisheries exhibition will be held in Edinburgh in April, 1882. The exhibition will be open to exhibitors from all countries, and is intended to include, as far as possible, objects illustrative of, or connected with, the fisheries of the world, such, for example, as models of boats used in fishing, and of steam engines suitable for fishing boats; models of fishing boat harbors and of fishermen's houses; nets, lines, fishing rods, artificial baits and fishing tackle of all kind; piscicultural apparatus; apparatus used in oyster culture; fish ova and young fry; aquaria, collections of stuffed fish and aquatic birds; paintings, photographs, and casts of fish; models of fish-passes and ladders; lifeboats and life-preserving apparatus; fishermen's dress and equipments; fresh, cured, and canned fish; preparations for preserving fish, and other objects of a similar nature. Applications for space must be made to "The Honorary Secretaries, International Fisheries Exhibition, 3 George IV. Bridge, Edinburgh," and should be restricted to the minimum amount required for the due display of articles sent for exhibition. No charge will be made for space for articles or collections of articles sent on loan, or for books, essays, official reports, or plans. Other exhibits will be charged at the rate of 1s. per square yard or 1s. per square foot. No less space than one square yard to be taken. Payment for space to be made on entry. The height of cases not to exceed 9 feet, but fishing rods allowed to be put up. The committee will pay the carriage of articles and collections of articles sent on loan.
