—Up to yesterday morning there had been but ten cases of small pox in Portland and one death.
—The Scandinavian Packing company give notice of a meeting of the stock holders on the 13th prox.

—The total amount so far subscribed toward the improvement of the harbor at Yaquina bay, amounts to \$2,502.
—The Pataha Spirit says there is a splendid opening in that country for the establishment of a first class nursery.
—A Harlem man ate one hundred and fifty clams the other day and was wuffed calmly to that land where clam bakes are unknown.
—Adler's new stock of goods, now being opened, is enormous. To enumerate the styles and varieties would be impossible. Take a look at them yourself.
—The British ship Thunderbolt, 1183 tons, cleared from Portland last Monday with 8679 barrels flour and 3125 cents wheat.
—S. T. McKean, secretary of the Masonic Land and Building Association gives notice of the annual meeting of the stockholders to be held on the 21st prox.

—On Sunday evening the scow Jim, owned by Henry Shaw, loaded with hay and lying in Gray's Bay, caught from the cabin stove, and cargo and vessel were entirely consumed.
—J. W. Conn has removed to the old stand of Warren and Eaton, opposite the Occident.
—The Standard says: Many dealers in meat are complaining that they cannot obtain sufficient pork to supply their customers, as the Chinese are buying up all the hogs in the country.

An Extensive Practice.
Dr. W. H. Patterson, says the Reno Gazette, was appointed army surgeon at Fort Bidwell in 1871, and from that time up to 1877 he probably practiced his profession over as wide a field as any doctor in history. The country was full of cattle men all the way from Truckee river to the British possessions, and broken arms and legs were made every day by the vacqueros being thrown or falling from their horses. There was no other doctor nearer on the south than Reno, on the west than Susanville, on the east than Omaha, and on the north there was nobody at all. He set all the bones, cured all the fevers and brought in all the bodies in Modoc county, California, Roop county, Nevada, and Lake and Grant counties, Oregon. He had as many as eight cattle herders lying at one time in Hironymous' Hotel, Cedarville, with broken limbs. His field was at least one hundred and fifty miles north and south and as far east and west. He kept fine saddle horses of his own, and when on a long ride he would change once or twice, leaving his on the road, and hiring one to ride out and back. It is said that he had the largest surgical practice in America in those years. Other doctors have come in since.

—Warren & Eaton have moved to the corner of Hamilton and Chenamus streets, in the building formerly occupied by Tremblard & Upshur.
—The British ship Lyttleton cleared from this port for Liverpool yesterday. She has on board 15 cases salmon, 28,798 bushels wheat and 3,875 barrels flour from Portland; from here she takes 3,042 barrels flour and 117 cases dried fruit. Her cargo is worth \$73,472.
—Picture frames in blue and silver; picture frames in mahogany and velvet; picture frames in every style and finish at Adler's.
—The New York Sun charges Baldwin, the defaulting Jersey cashier, with formerly being a newspaper man. This is the roughest thing on the profession that we have seen since the recent charge that Villard formerly reported for a newspaper in some wicked Eastern city.
—Chas. Stevens and Son have a stock of mouldings and moulders tools which can be bought cheap for cash to close out that branch of the business.

—A splendid lot of Eastern Oysters just arrived by the State of California at Tom Smith's Oyster Saloon, Main street.
—Under date of the 21st, a telegram from Dayton says, concerning the small pox: "The prospect is more cheering. Sixty cases are convalescent; no new cases; no additional deaths; all but thirty will be out Saturday. There are fifteen cases at the small pox hospital, of which eight will be out in two or three days. Fourteen houses have been disinfected."

—The Oregonian says that the fact that neighboring towns are quarantined against New Tacoma will in no way interfere with the prompt transmission of mail from Portland to Puget Sound ports. The O. R. & N. Co. has placed a special boat on the line exclusively for mail, which is received at New Tacoma without passing through local hands, carried to Elliott bay, and there transferred to Seattle by a small boat. No mail of any description is taken from the New Tacoma postoffice, and none is received there.
—Two new rooms, suitable for light housekeeping, over Geni saloon. Terms very reasonable.
—The Idaho papers are full lately of the Oregon Short Line railroad—the Union Pacific road to the ocean. It is settled definitely that the road will run into the famous Wood river gold mining country, and it is supposed that it will also run through or near Boise. It is said to be positively settled upon that it will come to both Portland and Puget Sound, though the route in neither cases is yet located. Coming to Puget Sound is a vague expression, as the Sound has two sides and is over a hundred miles long. If the road crosses the Cascade mountains within Washington Territory the Post Intelligencer thinks it will be pretty certain to terminate in Seattle.
