About these days begin the work of reconsidering the good resolutions of the new year.

The barkentine Melanethon came in yesterday; the North Bend and Mary E. Russ went out.

Never in the history of the Columbia river was there such a tonnage of wheat on board as last week.

The press, type, etc., comprising the plant of the old Portland Bulletin office were sold at sheriff's sale last Tuesday, and realized \$640.

The Merwanjee Franjee is ready to go out over the bar. She has 14,065 bbls. flour and 10,801 bus. wheat on board. Her cargo is worth \$71,666.

A codfish produces 3,686,760 eggs, a mackerel 454,860; a hen 39. A future awaits the man that can get the last named animal to average as she ought.

The Oregon Improvement Company has the contract for the timber for six railroad bridges on the route between Umattilla and Pendleton, and is going to fill the contract with timber from the mountains near Dayton.

The latest novelty is a dress album. A piece of every new dress is carefully cut and gummed on one side of the leaf, and the date attached. Thus the book forms a complete history of a lady's toilet from season to season.

It is said that in the East Indies it is the custom for a creditor to sit outside the door of a debtor, and refrain from eating until his claims were satisfied. The law is that the debtor must fast as long as the creditor does, so that it is more a question of stomach than finance. What a grand success as a collector Dr. Tanner would be in that country.

Mrs. S. C. White writes to the Standard from San Francisco that she was one of the five women—three of whom were married and two single—who came to Oregon from Boston for the Methodist mission in 1836. One of those single ladies married the Rev. Jason Lee, and died in little over a year, and the rest have all passed away except the old lady in question.

Under date of Jan. 15th our Tillamook correspondent writes that the schooner Alpha arrived in Tillamook on the 13th after a long stay in Astoria and Baker's bay on account of stormy weather. The people were very glad to see her as they were out of provisions. She discharged all her freight in good order, and is now loading butter and salmon for Astoria and Portland.

Lynched.

The assassins who brutally murdered George B. Reynolds, in Seattle, last Tuesday night, and Ben Payne, the alleged murderer of Officer Spiers, who was killed while on duty last October, were lynched by a vigilance committee composed of Seattle's citizens last Wednesday morning. The two former, Sullivan and Howard, were being given a preliminary examination in the justice court, and upon its conclusion and before the officials could interfere, they were overpowered, the prisoners carried outside, where a temporary gallows had been put up, and in a few minutes their lifeless bodies were swinging from the cross beam. No sooner was that done than four hundred men marched to the county jail, tore down the doors, took out Payne, and in less time than it takes to write it, according to the dispatch from which we quote, he also was strung up. The feeling in Seattle can best be shown by the fact that the coroner's jury, in their verdict upon the bodies, said: 'We are satisfied that in their deaths substantial and speedy justice has been subserved.'

Suicide.

A. A. Cohn shot himself through the head in San Francisco last Wednesday afternoon. He was well known here, having been for many years the agent of the Alaska Commercial company. About five weeks ago he went into partnership with C. Leinenweber in the tannery, but on the 1st inst. the partnership was dissolved. He was married a few weeks ago in Portland and went down to San Francisco with his bride on the Oregon on the 11th inst. It is thought that despondency in business caused the taking of his life, as he was short in his accounts, and unable to retain the position he had held so long. The feeling here among his friends and acquaintances is one of regret.

Masquerade Ball.

The boys of No. 1, intend giving a select masquerade ball on the 14th of February, and from the character of the gentlemen who have charge of it, it will be evidently an occasion of pleasure and satisfaction. Particular care will be taken as to the admission of unwelcome personages, and we are assured by members of the committee that they intend the ball will be up to the finest ever given here.

The weather-boarding is being put on the Pythian building, and considerable work is going on on the inside. When completed it will be a handsome structure, and an ornament to the city.

Carl Adler received a note from F. W. Steehan yesterday, stating that a big minstrel company would show here next Friday and Saturday. The company include Emerson's twelve clog dancers, and other features of special merit. Further particulars will doubtless be given in a day or so.

Speaking to Capt. Storratt, of the Levi P. Burgess, who came in the other day on the tug Brenham, in relation to the detention of his vessel outside, he said what everyone knows; that 'no amount of tugs could get my vessel in during such rough weather; the tugs are doing all they can; the trouble is there isn't enough water on the bar.' It is now in order for the Oregonian to severely call the captain a 'critic,' and crush him by writing an article on 'The game of greed.'

The Secretary of War decides that 'officers of the army now possess all the authority needed for the recovery of government arms found in the hands of improper persons. Under section 1242, revised statutes, any United States arms found in the possession of persons not soldiers can be taken from them by any civil or military officer of the United States. Any government arm found in the possession of a person (not a soldier) is prima facie evidence it is stolen; and the secretary deems it clearly the duty of every civil and military officer of the United States to seize, wherever found, any rifle, carbine, or pistol marked U. S. and of calibre .45.'

Columbia Salmon in New Zealand.

We are in receipt of a volume of reports from United States consuls in all parts of the world. Consul Griffin, writing to our government from Auckland, New Zealand, in reference to canned salmon, says:

'There was at the same time (1876) a notable increase in the trade in American canned vegetables, while the American salmon soon drove all other from the market. The English exporters, however, continue to send various kinds of preserved fish here such as sardines, herring, etc., but the United States now enjoys a complete monopoly of the salmon trade of New Zealand. The American salmon is imported principally in one-pound tins. The duty charged on it is two cents per pound.'

The wholesale price of good Columbia river salmon in Auckland varies from \$1.75 to \$2.10 per dozen one-pound tins, duty paid. They are packed in cases, each case containing about four dozen tins.

It sometimes happens that Columbia river salmon turns out badly. Not unfrequently tainted fish are put up and sometimes the packers fail to completely exhaust the air before the cans are hermetically sealed. If the air is not exhausted the can will become blown and of course the fish spoiled. The importers of Columbia river salmon tell me that they cannot give preference to any particular brand. If a shipment of a favorite brand should turn out bad the consumer is afraid to trust the brand again, and it is almost certain to be driven from the market. Sometimes the American packers label fish taken from Rogue, Alaska and Sacramento rivers, as Columbia river salmon. These goods are shipped here and sold at reduced rates, but as they are of indifferent quality they are calculated to injure the trade in the genuine Columbia river salmon.'

Then follows a table showing the value of salmon imports since 1870. In 1880 New Zealand imported salmon from here to the value of \$71,800.

Oregon and Washington Appropriations.

Congressman George has introduced a bill proposing the following appropriations for Oregon and Washington Territory rivers and harbors: For improvement of the mouth of Columbia river, as recommended by Col. Gillespie, U. S. Engineer, \$430,000; for constructing a Pacific coast harbor of refuge at Port Orford, \$250,000; for Cascade locks, \$750,000; lower Willamette and Columbia, \$133,000; Coos Bay, \$60,000; Yaquina Bay, \$60,000; Coquille Bar, \$25,000, and river above, \$2,500; upper Columbia and Snake rivers, \$20,000; upper Willamette and Yamhill, \$10,000; Umpqua, \$12,000; Lewis river, \$500; Alsea, \$2,500; Conwill, \$2,000; Siuslaw, \$1,500, and Young's river, \$1,000. Nearly all the foregoing amounts are the sums recommended by the engineers' department.

The Tug of War.

ASTORIA, JAN. 18, 1882. The Oregonian is much troubled about the size of tug boats at the mouth of the river. In some respects larger tugs would be better, provided the bar should be improved so that large vessels could come here. But the Oregonian would serve the farmers better if it would devote a little more time towards advocating the improvement at the mouth of the river so that tugs could be dispensed with and the vessels sail in and out. Improvement of the channel would be better than some new pilot bill to give Portland a monopoly with its two iron tugs. EX.
