A Specimen

Yesterday's Oregonian says: A guardian's sale of real estate, covering 53,263 acres, is advertised in Grant county. The lands belong to an estate to which they came through The Dalles military road land grant. The sale, as advertised, embraces only the listed and surveyed portions. The unlisted and unsurveyed lands belonging to the grant in the same county are estimated at 100,000 acres. This is one of those prodigious grants made by congress for which the public has received no equivalent, nor ever will. Oregon is suffering from half a dozen huge jobs of this kind, which have absorbed in the aggregate millions of acres, but from which not the slightest benefit has ever been received by government or people.

Inquiry into the recent alleged slaughtering of sailors of the Indiana show that it was the evident intention of the men to jump the vessel if they got a chance, and that there was no intent to coerce any of them. Captain Morrison has them on board and will, we learn, have no trouble in getting them to go back to duty without resorting to rigid discipline or punishment.

The social at Capt. Merryman's last Friday evening was fully up to the usual good time enjoyed by those who attend those deservedly popular gatherings. The fact that the ministers were at Liberty hall, did not materially decrease the number present. The various religious organizations of Astoria deserve praise for their efforts in behalf of social intercourse among the citizens.

The Oregon Statesman says: "A party of engineers surveying a route for the Canadian-Pacific Railway across the Rocky mountains have been so completely cut off from the world in the wilderness, that it was only a few days ago that they learned of the death of President Garfield." Bar pilots tell us that on boarding inward bound vessels for the last six months, one of the first questions is, "How is Garfield?" and when told of his death the next remark is one consigning his assassin to eternal perdition.

We learn from what can only be considered the best authority, says the Walla Walla Journal, that under the orders of Mr. Villard, one new steamer is being outfitted, and two others are being repaired for service in the interest of the O. R. & N. Co. on the upper waters of the Columbia. It is said that one will navigate above Priest Rapids, another will work above Kettle Falls and a third will navigate the tributaries. The immense mining and timber regions of the Upper Columbia are at last attracting the attention of practical capitalists.

Owing to low water in the Willamette and Columbia rivers, steamers carry very light cargoes; and only 5,000 sacks of potatoes are sent down each stream when they could carry 20,000, with plenty of water. If Portland would stand aside and let Astoria be our sea port, Oregon products could be sent off much more expeditiously—Willamette Farmer. Heartless Villainy.

In an account of the bigamy and desertion case to which we gave publicity a few days ago, the Standard says that at a respectable boarding house in Portland, Mr. James A. Lawrence and wife formed the acquaintance of Miss Nellie Sloan, a modest appearing girl of 19 years, daughter of ex-policeman Captain Sloan, who was living there. About a year ago Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence began housekeeping and took Miss Sloan with them to board. Secretly Mr. Lawrence made love to the young boarder, and on the 16th inst. married her at Astoria, taking steamer immediately for San Francisco. In order to quiet suspicion and give themselves ample time to escape, Miss Sloan pretended she was going to Salem, but instead went to Astoria and registered under the name of Miss Miller, and Mr. Lawrence told his confiding wife that he had to make a trip to San Francisco for his employers, but instead got off the State of California at Astoria, registered at the Occident hotel as P. F. Squires and was married under that name to Miss Sloan—who gave her right name—by Rev. J. V. Milligan, in time to take the same steamer for San Francisco. Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence came to Portland about three years ago, and formed the acquaintance of a large circle and were universally liked. At first Mr. Lawrence was employed as a teacher at the Bishop Scott Grammar School, and may be recollected by many as the organist at Trinity Church up to six months ago, and at the time of his elopement was employed as a clerk in the lighthouse department under Col. Gillespie. In appearance he was short and stout, but otherwise good looking—parting his hair in the middle. The wife he leaves behind him is a lady of much culture and refinement, and up to the time of his villainy lived happily with him, never suspecting him of duplicity even after he had failed to go to the Palace hotel as he said he would. On New Year's day Mrs. Von Bolton, of London, mother of the forsaken wife—who is now here visiting her—presented her with \$300 and Lawrence took that with him, even leaving his poor wife to pay for a diamond ring which he presented to Miss Sloan as a token of engagement. Miss Sloan also applied herself with \$3,000 which was in the bank in her name, half of which being her father's—the proceeds of the sale of a piece of property left by the late Mrs. Sloan, the runaway's mother, Lawrence left a few debts behind him, but his forsaken wife has made arrangements to satisfy all creditors. Broken hearted, and her home "desolated by a wretch, Mrs. Lawrence will soon leave with her mother for her old home in England. She is well rid of the wretch, and we hope that the punishment of her base husband's crime may soon overtake him and be meted out with no unsparring hand.

Guiteau's Opinion.

A Washington dispatch says: When Guiteau arrived at the jail after the verdict, his pale, haggard face indicated great depression, mingled with anxiety and fear. The jail officials remarked that he was more depressed than at any time since his arraignment. To Warden Crocker he remarked: "The verdict startled me, but I was not surprised. Judge Cox's charge was a very fair one, with a single exception. He did not dwell with sufficient force on the recent decision of the New York court of appeals. Had he done so the jury would have acquitted me. Judge Porter's bitter speech had too much impression on the jury. I saw the effect and hence was somewhat prepared for the verdict."

"Do you have any fears that you will die on the scaffold," asked the reporter.

"I am in the hands of the Lord," replied the prisoner, "and I have no apprehensions. Life is but a span. It is appointed to all men one to die, and no man will die before his appointed time. No man can say to-day that he will be alive to-morrow."

Guiteau expressed the hope that the court would grant him a new trial. He believed he would have the assistance of a prominent Baltimore lawyer and the question of jurisdiction would come up.

After the trial Judge Cox was asked if he was surprised that the jury returned a verdict so soon. He said he could not say he was. The jury was an intelligent one and the case had been too plainly stated for them to do otherwise. The inordinate vanity of the prisoner had led to this result. He would not say what he thought of the prospect of a new trial.
