The Baker City Railroad.

The Baker City Tribune has been interviewing Mr. E. H. Mix, engineer in charge of the O. R. & N. Co. surveys east of the summit of the Blue mountains. It reports Mr. Mix as quite sanguine that the O. R. & N. Co. will complete their line to this point and on to Snake river with all possible dispatch, and from the fact that contracts are already made to build the road bed from Pendleton to La Grande, there would appear reasonable grounds for his opinion. The survey is already made and located, and having been properly filed, this company take precedence in the right of way. For a few miles in the Burnt river region, where the road must go, there is room for but one road bed, and there seems to be some strife as to which one of the railroad companies shall finally secure the pass. A Question.
