The People's Domain.

No Show.

A LETTER written by Judah P. Benjamin, the Confederate Secretary of War, in relation to the recent speculation in the bonds of that defunct government, sets completely at rest the report that at the close of the war money was on deposit in England to its credit. He says the suits entered by the United States against the brokers and the financial agent of the Confederacy, which resulted in the recovery of a few thousand dollars, proved conclusively that no money remained to its credit. He also says that the United States Government received supplies, machinery, several vessels, and, in fact, everything that remained from the wreck, and does not believe that one penny is to be found in Europe to the credit of "The Lost Cause." This drives the last nail in the coffin of a promising speculation, and only goes to show upon what a slender thread commercial enterprises as well as eternal things may hang.

THE wreck of the St. Louis Mutual Life Association is one of the most complete disasters in all the disastrous history of life insurance speculation. Its assets are less than \$10,000, all in litigation, and of doubtful collection, while the policy claims allowed by the referee amount to over a million. Co-operative societies and benevolent organizations have dealt life insurance business a blow from which it will hardly recover.

A SINGULAR case is reported from New Jersey, where a woman who was indicted for bigamy, offers in defense a notice of her first husband's death, printed in a newspaper. It came out in the course of the trial that the notice was published for malicious purposes, and the Court is in a state of distraction, there being no precedent to form a basis for judgment.

TWENTY-ONE years ago this month the southern states were scrambling out of the Union as fast as they could. Now they are trying to dictate to the west what course of policy should be pursued; the best of it is that they are sincere, though the old idea of "dominance dies hard."

The present trouble with the Democracy of Oregon seems to be a difficulty in ascertaining just what Democratic views are. Of course, this is a slight matter to differ upon, but in the absence of anything heavier it gives rise to a considerable discussion.

What Worried Him.

In an article on the spoils system in the current number of the North American Review, Mr. Andrew D. White, President of Cornell University, relates a few anecdotes pertinent to the subject. In the darkest hour of the civil war, the people of a thriving Northern town, called for convenience, Pepperton, were agitated far more by the question as to who should be appointed Postmaster than by the issue of some of the most important battles then being waged. Deputation after deputation rushed to Washington beseeching Congressmen, Senators and President, and while rivers of blood and billions of treasure were flowing away, a good Presbyterian deacon resolved to go himself to the capital and see if he could not settle the great national question of the Pepperton postoffice. He was shocked at the careworn face of President Lincoln, and, in hopes of consoling him, said: "Mr. Lincoln, I am sorry to see you not looking so well as when you passed through Pepperton. You must not let the rebellion wear upon you. The Lord is with us. He will not permit slavery and disunion to conquer. He has purposes with this Republic which—" "Oh, Judge," interrupted Mr. Lincoln, "it isn't the rebellion that is killing me—it isn't the rebellion, it is your plighted Pepperton postoffice!" "Columns of argument," says Mr. White, "could not so well reveal the effect of the present system upon the Executive; but the fun becomes grim earnest when one recalls the late of Harrison and Garfield."

AN iron buoy, fitted with apparatus intended to convert the power of wave motion into electricity, which will, in turn, supply an electric light, has been anchored in the lower bay outside of New York harbor. That would be a good thing for the mouth of the Columbia.

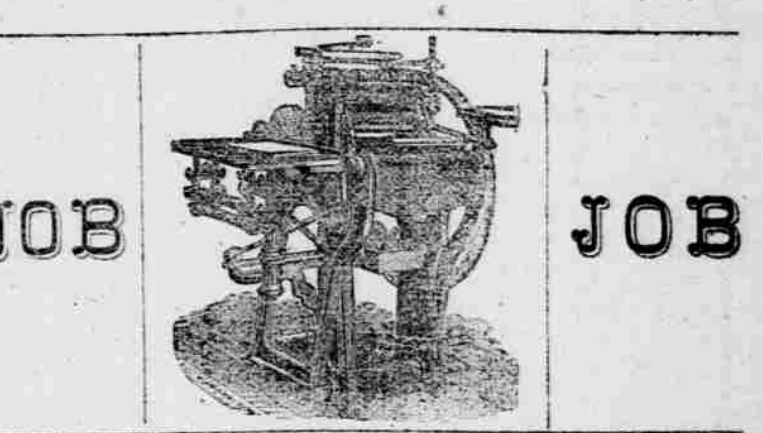
