The Columbia will leave Portland at five o'clock to-morrow afternoon.

The British ship City Camp is ready for sea. She has 53,065 bushels of wheat on board, worth \$52,524.

Preliminary surveys have been begun along the line of the proposed road from Olympia to Gray's Harbor.

The thermometer yesterday morning stood at 22 degrees, the coldest we have experienced this winter; a keen wind from the north solidified the slush of the day before and made walking a hazardous affair.

J. E. Miller, on his farm at Eddy Point, half a mile below Knappa, has discovered an Indian burial ground. It is on a side hill overgrown with vine maple. His dog bringing in a skull was the first intimation of its whereabouts.

Seven thousand dollars of city bonds was taken yesterday at one-eighth premium. The committee advertise for proposals for the remainder, which was not taken yesterday on account of some informality in the bids.

The Multnomah county court has ordered that a reward of \$1,000 should be given for the detection and arrest of the parties who shall be convicted of the murder of the man whose body was found in the Willamette river near Nicolai's wharf on the 28th of last November.

The Umattila arrived in yesterday loaded with six locomotives for the O. R. & N. Co., and ballasted with 500,000 gallons of water. The liquid ballast was discharged through funnels as she went up the river, thus lightening her and causing a freshet in the stream with the water from San Francisco bay.

A thief who robbed a Nashville farmer of several hundred dollars at nine o'clock in the morning was apprehended at noon, indicted by the grand jury at one P. M., tried in the criminal court at two, and at three o'clock had been convicted and was on his way to the penitentiary. This is one of those stories that has a moral.

We are informed by the managers of the Olympic social party that several unique and interesting features will be introduced, which will be well worth seeing. Among them may be mentioned tableaux which are now in preparation and which, when rendered with all the requisite stage accessories and scenic effects, red and blue lights, etc., must prove a capital attraction.

If Lient Schwatka gets all the mileage that he claims, he will be independent for life. A bill before Congress provides that he shall have not only full pay and commutation of quarters during his Arctic search, but mileage from Spotted Tail Agency, Dakota, via New York to North Hudson's bay, and thence back to New York, and so on to Vancouver barracks. Should this bill pass, journeys to the Arctic regions may grow in favor with army officers; and they will find additional inducements for going as far and keeping in motion as long as possible.

The Columbia River.

Away back in 1850 there were grave doubts about the navigability at all seasons of the Columbia. An advertisement in the Oregon Spectator, dated Nov. 23, 1850, announcing the proposal to build a "railroad from Milton and St. Helens to LaFayette," at an estimated cost of \$500,000. The projectors of the road, W. H. Tappan, of St. Helens, and Crosby & Smith, of Milton, say, "it is almost useless to add, that the terminus of this road should be a point that can be reached with safety by large class vessels at any season, and at any stage of the river." To-day, after thirty years afterwards, the predicted railroad is yet to be built; St. Helens is a dilapidated town, Milton has disappeared from the map and the Columbia, without improvement, floats vessels larger than the residents of Oregon in 1850 dreamed of. - Walla Walla Union.

Rienzi.

A small audience assembled at the Congregational church last Thursday evening to hear Rev. R. W. Hill, of Salem lecture on Rienzi, one of the most wonderful characters in history. Commencing with an account of the feudal system, and the manners and customs of five hundred years ago, he gave a vivid account of the condition of Rome when the Roman Pontiffs had transferred their court to Avignon and how Rienzi, dreaming of the old days of the Republic had succeeded through perseverance and eloquence in rousing the Roman populace to an enthusiasm of patriotic impulse. Then was portrayed his success, his triumph, his downfall, his exile, wanderings, intrigues, capture, deliverance, return to Rome, reinstatement as Tribune, debauchery, final downfall and miserable death. In a patriotic oration the reverend lecturer paid a glowing tribute to our own country and its institutions, fervently hoping that the republic might never fall into such gross and cruel hands as did the Roman republic when fell Rienzi the last of the Roman Tribunes.
