The Portland Board of Trade has very sensibly resolved that the Hawaiian Treaty should be abrogated. It is thought that the Idaho, which went to the Sound last Tuesday, will be put on in place of the Eureka.

Attention is directed to the ad. of William Hume, who has arranged to furnish cannery supplies of all kinds. The only observance of Washington's birthday that we noticed was the flying of flags from several of the public buildings, and places.

The case of small pox in the family of Mr. James Bell, in Upper Astoria, is, we learn, doing very well. No other cases have yet occurred. On Tuesday, Dr. Tuttle, assisted by Dr. Lockhart, extracted the bullet from the forehead of young Hayden. It was in two pieces. Hopes are now entertained of his recovery.

They are still squabbling over the bills of the Yorktown celebration, last October. One bill is for \$25 for "water furnished to guests," and that particular item the Virginians cannot understand. O. J. Salisbury has secured the contract for carrying the mails between Roseburg and Redding at \$48,220 per annum. P. F. McManus gets the contract on the Yreka-Linkville route at \$550 a year.

Meeting of the Pioneer and Historical Society.

The executive board of the Pioneer and Historical Society of Oregon met yesterday. Meeting called to order, Vice-Pres. Gray in the chair. Minutes of last meeting of the board were read and approved. Communication from Asst. Sec. of Interior giving list of documents forwarded to the Society; read and ordered filed. The following communications were also read and placed on file, viz: From Hon. H. P. Kincaid, editor of Oregon State Journal, with printed matter in relation to Whitman monument. Interesting letters were read from Mrs. Caroline Sager Pringle, of Pringle, Or., from Wm. J. Marshall, Esq., of Fitchburg, Mass., and from Hon. W. S. Ladd, of Portland, Or. The corresponding secretary stated that each of the above communications had been answered by him. Secretary stated that an order had been drawn on the treasury for \$63 57, amount due O. R. & N. Co. for freight on lumber, etc., from Portland to Whitman Station. It was moved and seconded that the corresponding secretary be requested on behalf of the Society to extend an invitation to the Hon. Elwood Evans, of New Tacoma, W. T., to deliver an address at the annual meeting of this Society, May 11, 1882; motion carried. The board, on motion, approved the circular letter prepared by the corresponding secretary and addressed to editors of papers, journals, etc. On motion adjourned.

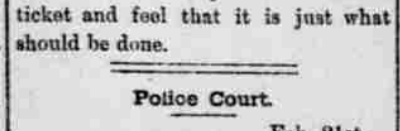
Worthy Benefit.

Useful Information.

The following is of interest to many being a decision on questions that often arise.

U. S. LAND OFFICE, OREGON CITY, OR. January 18th, 1882.

E. H. Griffin, Albany, Oregon. In reply to yours of the 12th, inst., I have to inform you that upon the death of a homestead settler before the completion of his claim, the widow may make final proof upon completing requirements of the law, and the title passes to her; or if she die also, then the heirs may continue residence upon and cultivation of the claim, and the title, upon proper proof of fulfillment of the law, will vest in them.

Where both parents die, leaving infant children, the homestead may be sold for cash, for the benefit of such children, and the purchaser will receive title from the United States; or upon proof of cultivation of the land required, patent to the land will issue to the said infant heirs; personal residence on the claim not being required in a case as above stated.

In case a settler under the pre-emption law should die before establishing his claim within the period of time limited by law, the title may be perfected by the executor, administrator, or one of the heirs; by making proper proof, and payment of the land; the entry to be made in the name of the heirs of the deceased settler.

The right to change a pre-emption filing to a homestead entry belongs only to the party who made the pre-emption filing, and could, therefore, not be changed by the widow, or heirs, or administrator, as the case might be. Pre-emption or homestead claims may be filed by persons who are the head of a family, widows, or single persons over the age of 21 years, and who are native born citizens of the United States, or have declared their intention to become such citizen. A unmarried woman cannot file a claim as a widow; but she could make such filing as the head of a family, if she really were the head of a family.

It is held in the rulings of the general land office that a deserted wife, or one whose husband is a confirmed drunkard, is the head of a family, or a married woman who has minor children, and has been abandoned by her husband without cause and left to support herself and children, is the head of a family.

Any person who has the requisite qualifications to file a homestead or pre-emption claim, may also file a timber-culture entry without regard to how much land they may own.

In case a person under age, who is not the head of a family, makes a filing upon land, under the homestead, pre-emption, or timber-culture laws, such filing is void, but it does not exclude such person from making a legal entry upon attaining the proper age. If the party filing this was single and under the age of 21 years, a contest based upon affidavit made by the plaintiff setting forth the facts, and acknowledged before a county clerk, notary public, or the register or receiver of this office, would be initiated. The plaintiff in a contest must deposit \$10, for defrayment of costs in the case.

A hearing is then ordered by this office to be had in the case, to be held before a county clerk, or notary public resident in the county in which the contested tract lies.
