At the school election held in the second ward a few evenings ago, Jas. W. Welch was elected school director and C. W. Shively clerk.

It is thought that our sister territory must wait another year for admission as a state. Next year her plea will be too strong to be gainsayed.
Dr. Murray, of London, is writing a dictionary of the English language which, when completed, will be four times as large as Webster's Unabridged.

In the year 1879 there was collected and expended for educational purposes in the United States and Territories the enormous sum of \$78,385,956.
Judge Burnett, of Corvallis, has been appointed Circuit Judge of the second judicial district, to fill the vacancy caused by Judge Watson's resignation.
Counterfeit half dollars bearing date of 1877, and purporting to be coined at the Philadelphia Mint, are in circulation. They are a clever imitation, and can only be detected by the imperfect milling.

It is authoritatively stated that the western end of the Northern Pacific railroad will reach Missoula by January 1, 1883. At present snow lies five feet deep on the ground, but the 3000 laborers continue their work, the snow being up to their armpits.
The Norwegian bark Joaflaver and the British ship County of Bute and Edderside, are ready to go to sea. They have 22,113 barrels flour, 81,408 bushels wheat, and 60 elk horns for our English cousins. The three cargoes are worth in square numbers \$184,914.
The sixty degrees of space between Newfoundland and Oregon is to be divided into four equal parts by the American Meteorological Society, who propose to establish a separate standard time for each. The difference in time between each division and the adjoining one would be exactly an hour. The same society proposes that the continent be laid out in parallel strips, running north and south, each fifteen degrees wide, in each of which the standard time would be based on its own meridian.

British Columbia Salmon.
Consul Francis, of Victoria, writes to our government relative to the salmon fisheries of neighboring waters. He says that probably in no part of the earth are salmon found in greater abundance and varieties than in the waters of the Northern Pacific coast. Those which experience has proven to be of the better quality and most marketable are the Squal and Suck-kai (so called by the Indians) and generally known by the name of the silver salmon. In weight, these average from 8 to 12 pounds, and are very fat, with the flesh of a deep red. They make their appearance from early in spring till late in the fall, and enter the rivers in May and June, on their way to the lakes and heads of streams where generated. At this period the canneries are opened for work, having previously prepared their cans and cases, and continue, some of them, day and night until the season closes, generally in October.
It is noticed that the salmon deteriorate on ascending the rivers, and by the time of reaching their spawning grounds are completely changed, being poor and colorless in flesh, bruised and blind. After depositing their eggs, few if any such ever reach the sea again, the shores of the lakes and streams being literally covered with putrefying salmon, affording beasts and birds a great feast. The number meeting this fate yearly is estimated at many millions.

The first and last run of salmon taken in tide water are held in higher estimation than the intermediate ones, and are preferred for canning. Beside the silver salmon during the season, there is the Tyhee (big salmon) and salmon trout, the former weighing from 15 to 40 pounds, fat and flesh of a rich pink color, the salmon trout from 10 to 20 pounds, also fat, but flesh of a lighter color—both used for canning.
The foregoing varieties, among other are also found in the waters of Alaska, partaking of the same qualities, fully as numerous, and make their appearance about the same time. The salmon at Cook's Inlet, Alaska, are the largest and fattest on the coast; are caught there weighing from 30 to 100 pounds, and at certain seasons of the year its waters are reported alive with them.

There appears to be no limit to the salmon on the Northern Pacific coast, and the only matter to be considered in embarking in the business is a market.
The put up of salmon last season in this province is estimated as follows: canned, 130,000 cases; 2,000 barrels pickled; and 30 tons of smoked. The canned are in 1 and 2 pounds tins, 50 pounds in a case; prices ranging from \$4.75 to \$5 per case; pickled, in barrels, \$7; and smoked, 8 to 10 cents per pound.

The price of fresh salmon at the canneries when purchased of whites and Indians, who make it a business of taking them during the canning season, varies in different localities from 4 to 5 cents each, regardless of size, to \$5 per ton. Several of the canneries have their own nets and employ fishermen by the day or month. The Indians take the salmon by various methods, their favorite one being traps, ingeniously constructed at low tide on the flats, which prove quite as successful as the gill nets used by the white man.
The labor of the canneries is performed principally by Chinamen and Indians, at from \$30 to \$35 dollars per month. The cost of putting up salmon in cans and cases is said to range all along from \$2.25 to \$3.25, and pickled in barrels from \$3.75 to \$4, including the barrel.
The value of the export of salmon from the province, canned, pickled, and smoked, as near as can be ascertained, for 1880 was \$317,410. The business is increasing from year to year in the province.
